

What is to be Expected

TRIUMPHAL TRIP FROM SEBASTAFOL.

Startling Events Are To Be Expected During The Next Few. Days-To' Stubbornly Resist The Landing of The Japanese.

London, April 19 .- A dispatch to the London Dispatch, from Shanghai, says that, according to a telegram from Chefoo, two warships passed Chefoo harbor, Monday night, proceeding westward. Flash lights were seen and gun firing heard. According to the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail, Admiral

Skrydloff, who has been appointed to succeed the late Admiral Makaroff is of the way from Sebastapol to St. Petersburg, notwithstanding his ported instructions to proceed direct to Port Arthur.
