TIDINGS RACE ROSE FROM SEA WATER

Startling Discovery Backs Up Darwin's Theory.

New York, April 19.-The Sun has the following from London; Ten years ago the injection of salt water as a restorative to patients dying from loss of blood aroused general interest. The discovery of this quality of salt water probably suggested to the French savant, M. Quinton, a long and patient research concerning sea water, the conclusions of which throw unexpected light on and adds support to the Darwinian theory of evolution. M. Quinton maintains that sea water is the natural source from which, as Prof. Haeckel believes, elementary bodies rise which develop into all the species, including the human. The en-
