THE OUTLOOK IS NOT QUITE BRIGHT.

The Trouble Is Over The Work Each Class Of Workmen Shall Do—A Stand Made For The Lathers.

The friction existing between the Masons' Union and the Union of the Masons' Helpers instead of being brought to a settlement by the meeting, yesterday afternoon, seems to be further than ever from a satisfactory conclusion.
