EMIGRATION OFFICIALS DECLARE IT PRACTICABLE.

He Would Establish An Imperial Labor Bureau To Send Persons Without Work Where They Could Find Homes And Employment.

London, May 4.—General Booth's great scheme to establish an imperial labor bureau, and to place the workless and hopeless people where they are needed in the colonies, has met with a very favorable reception. W. E. Preston, the commissioner of emigration for Canada, described it to a representative of The Inter-Ocean as a magnificent project.

"It is a workable scheme," he said, "and it will go a long way toward the solution of what is known as the 'social problem' in this country. Twenty-five per cent. of our emigrants belong to the best class of sober and industrious people. They would go to Canada to-morrow, but they have not the means of crossing the Atlantic. The other day Lord Minto received a letter from a sixteen-year-old boy who begged to be allowed a chance in Canada, as he could not earn enough money in this country to support his mother."

"The boy's case is now being investigated on this side. I have long been puzzled to know why British philanthropy, which is the most wonderful in the world, has not promoted such a scheme as General Booth's before now. 'Of course,' continued Mr. Preston, 'if the government were to attempt such a project, the expenses of organization would be enormous, but the Salvation Army, working in co-operation with the Canadian government, have their vast machinery ready to hand. 'Every man sent out to Canada will have work found for him. In many cases of men with small families the Ontario government have built small houses for the wives and children, and allotted them a plot of land for produce raising. Their legislation enables them also to take away children from drunken or immoral parents, and the state, in its own interest, looks after these children and finds work for them. Even if General Booth's scheme could not be made self-supporting, the matter of pounds, shillings, and pence should not be allowed to weigh against the welfare, moral and physical, of the nation.'"

Bruce Lefroy, agent general for Western Australia, said: "To be a success, the scheme must be worked from within, not from without. That is to say, the Australians themselves must decide where the men are to go and what men shall go. 'There are,' admitted Mr. Lefroy, 'vast tracts of country ready for emigrants, but I am doubtful about the 'unsubmerged tenth.' If the man who will not work in this country can be made to work in Australia, then all will be well. 'In the south-west division of western Australia there are over 8,000,000 acres ready for settlers. 'The great population at the gold fields, which produces nothing from the soil but gold, is dependent upon the coast for all its provisions. 'Here there is an splendid opportunity for the tillers of the soil. The finest produce in the world can be raised in this southwest division. 'The cultivation of the soil creates a demand for other trades, but this is the first step toward the growth of a country. Mechanics and carpenters and builders cannot find employment until the agriculturist has commenced his work. 'The total imports of farm produce for last year approximated to £1,750,000. The produce could easily be raised locally. 'There are any number of the right sort of young farmers who would go if their passages were paid, and there are the men that western Australia requires.'"

"Dooney" Hardy is pitching good ball for Atlanta in the Southern League. He scored a shut out in his first match, letting Birmingham down with 4 hits and registered 9 strikeouts.

Miss Emily Florence Crichton, who fought his election battle for him while he was fighting the Boers, and had the proud satisfaction of seeing him placed at the top of the poll by over a thousand votes. He has not only distinguished himself as a volunteer soldier in South Africa, but also as a volunteer in the battle of Wight. One of his most daring exploits in the latter capacity was swimming with a life-line in a tempestuous sea to the aid of a French vessel which was at the point of foundering just outside the range of the rocket apparatus. Nine lives were saved by this piece of heroism.

Little Girl's Terrible Death.
Watertown, N.Y., May 5.—Blanche Derovine, of Dexter, aged six, came to her death in a most frightful manner. While playing around a bonfire her dress caught fire and she ran for the house. The breeze made by her rapid flight fanned the flames, which soon enveloped her entire body, inflicting burns from which she died soon after.

ROMANCE OF SELF-HELP.

Boy-Worker Who Became M.P. and Millionaire.
London, May 5.—A romantic career was brought to a close by the death, at the age of sixty-four of William Williams, of Morriston, near Swansea, who started life as a humble boy-worker and became a millionaire. It is a record of self-help, perhaps aided a little by chance of fortune, such as the late Dr. Smiles would have eagerly seized upon to point his cherished moral. Heretofore all day as cold-roll boy in the Upper Forest tin-plate works, of which he was destined ultimately to become the owner, young Williams studied at night school. Then came a terrible blow. He met with an accident at the works, and one of his legs was amputated. His employer gave him a place in the counting-house, and here young Williams, triumphing over his misfortune, displayed rare ability, and rose rapidly. He became manager of the Swansea tin-plate works, and then he started the Worcester tin-plate works. These being successful he was able to acquire the Upper Forest works. After having made himself the largest tin-plate manufacturer in the world, and controlling in the combined enterprises, which employ 3,000 hands, an enormous trade in every market, he retired. The wonders of the Worcester and Upper Forest works attracted metalurgical authorities from far and near, for it is a rare sight to see a red-hot ten-hundredweight ingot of steel picked up and rolled into a ribbon in the twinkling of an eye. The year 1884 found him mayor of Swansea, and upon the elevation of Sir Hussey Vivian to the peerage in 1892 he was returned unopposed to parliament for Swansea district, but retired two years later. In a speech in the house he said with pride that he had used tongs in the rolling-mill and the mandril in the mine. An exceedingly generous man, he never slighted any one he had known in his humble days. Often he was seen making his way through the streets of Swansea with the aid of crutches, and he had a kindly word for every one he recognized.

Mitchell's Trip Postponed.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 5.—President John Mitchell of the United Mine Workers was to have sailed for Europe to-day, but at the headquarters of the organization it was said his trip has been postponed until fall. Mr. Mitchell will represent the miners of America at the International Miners' Congress, which is to meet in Paris in August.

Robert Barlett, Gannaogque, died on Sunday, aged fifty-four years, from bronchitis and heart trouble. A widow and four sons survive.
