Vicero Alexieff's dispatch from Port Arthur is interpreted here to mean that the place is in imminent danger of isolation, and the Japanese preparations for landing are considered as confirm ing the belief that Port Arthur has been sealed up, probably by the two sunken ships, which the Russians failed to locate.
