CENTRAL TRUNK LINE.

Anxious To Build From Gaspé Basin To Lakes.

Ottawa, May 11.—A deputation of four Chicago railway promoters called on the premier yesterday and explaining their proposition for the incorporation of the Central Trunk Railway Company, which proposes to revive the Atlantic and Lake Superior scheme for a through system from Gaspé Basin to a port on the great lakes. They applied for a government guarantee of twenty million dollars of railway bonds and of seven million dollars of bonds to bridge the St. Lawrence river at Montreal. Their proposal is to build from Gaspé Basin to Paspébie, to buy out the Atlantic and Lake Superior line, thence to Metapédia, to build an airline from Metapédia to Rivière du Loup, saving seventy miles over the present Intercolonial route. They would use the I.C.R. from Rivière du Loup to Lévis and the Great Eastern and Montreal and Sorel lines thence to Montreal. The proposal is to build a new bridge at Metapédia and to either buy or build a connection with Georgian Bay. The promoters of this thirty-four million dollar venture are willing to concede the Intercolonial running rights to the Great Lakes. Their idea is to open up a large shipping business to and from the port of Gaspé basin, which is open to navigation ten months in the year.

EDGE OF WORLD

THE FARTHEST DISTANT ISLANDS POPULATED.

Seventy-Three Persons Spend Idyllic Existence—Get News From Outside World Only Once a Year.

London, May 11.—The man of war Odin, which returned recently from Tristan da Cunha, the furthest distant civilized corner of the world, brought interesting tidings of the little colony of Englishmen who inhabit them. The islands comprise a small group lying in the South Atlantic, midway between the coast of South America and the Cape of Good Hope. The largest island in the group is twenty-one miles in circumference, and rises in a central conical mountain to a height of 7,540 feet.

At the present time, according to the news brought back on the Odin, the population is seventy-three, English by birth, religion, and associations. Their only link with the outside world is the yearly visit of the warship, which brings to the inhabitants the mails, provisions, and parcels. There is no sort of government whatever on the islands.

The islands were discovered by the Portuguese in 1506. It was annexed by Britain in 1817, a company of artillery being kept to watch Napoleon at St. Helena. On death of Napoleon in 1821 the gunners were withdrawn, with the exception of a corporal named Glass and two companions, who, with some whaling men, were the founders of the present settlement.

A TOTAL WRECK!

Schooner Caught In Gale, Went To Pieces.

South Haven, Mich., May 11.—The schooner Anne F. Morse, sailing from White Lake, was wrecked three miles north of here, Frank Tyler, of Holland, losing his life. On Sunday night a heavy north-wester struck the boat and after several hours the ship parted aft and forward. The three men aboard all ran toward the yawl, the captain, Will Minter, succeeding in getting in and cutting the davits, which left the yawl afloat without any oars. The other two men, Walter Craft and Tyler, stuck to the ship, which capsized, but when it righted Tyler was gone, and Craft still clinging to a mast with which he came ashore. Tyler has not been found. Capt. Minter had a hard time on the yawl on account of the heavy surf, but succeeded in getting ashore, and after several hours being able to climb up a hill to a farm house,

where he obtained help. The schooner is a complete wreck, her load and parts being strewn for several miles along the beach. Parties on the beach are watching for the lost man. (On account of the distance the life-saving crew could do nothing.

PENETANG REFORMATORY.

Buildings Converted Into Asylum For Senile Insane.

The Penetang reformatory has passed into history. One hundred boys have been transferred to foster homes, and the institution, as a reformatory, has ceased to exist. From being a home for juveniles, the buildings will be devoted to sheltering the other extreme—old age. A busy staff of workers are now engaged converting the buildings into an asylum for the insane—called senile insane. It is expected that by the first of June or a little later in the month, a large number of senile patients will be removed from the other institutions to the Penetang asylum. This will provide a perpetual accommodation at the other institutions for patients not otherwise provided for.
