CLAIM OF 14TH VETERANS.

For Land Grants Meets Favor From Military Gazette.

The Canadian Military Gazette, in discussing the request by the veterans of the 14th P.W.O. Rifles of Kingston for land grants, says:

"At the commencement of the North-West Rebellion in 1865, this smart corps at once volunteered for service. At the time it was feared that a Fenian incursion might be attempted, advantage being taken of the absence of large bodies of our troops in the North-West. In consequence the 14th was retained at its own headquarters to guard the important stores and military magazines at Kingston. Here the men remained on service, many for three months, some for as long as a year. True the danger was, as it turned out, nothing; probably that made their case all the harder for these men who go up their ordinary business at great loss in consequence of having to answer their country's call, but their service was none the less the direct result of the North-West Rebellion and a necessary one at that, from the view-point of those in authority at the time. The men who were out as we have described have formed an association, and are now petitioning the Dominion government for the general service medals, and a share in any land grants that the Dominion may be making.

"Inasmuch as war medals may be quietly been granted to British regiments which had started for but never reached the front, the claim of our Kingston friends does not seem to be unfounded. The present excellent practice of giving bars on medals, which designate the battles in which the wearer has been engaged, serves the purpose of distinguishing between those who meant well, and those who really did well, so that while the former deserving fellows do not so unwarrantably receive the same as those who fought with the men who really bore the brunt."

Korean Diet.

A recent visitor to Korea writes: "The Korean is omnivorous. Birds of the air, beasts of the field and fish from the sea, nothing comes amiss to his palate. Dog meat is in great request at certain seasons: pork and beef with blood unrefined from the carcass; fowls and game-birds cooked with the lights, giblets, head and claws intact; fish sun-dried and highly malolorous, all are acceptable to him. Cooking is not always necessary; a species of small fish is preferred raw, dressed in some of the sauces. Other dainties are dried seaweeds, shrimps, vermacelli, made by the women from buckwheat flour and white of egg; pine seed, lily bulbs, honey water, wheat, barley, millet, rice, maize, wild potatoes and all vegetables of western and eastern gardens; even now the list is by no means exhausted."
