Washington Government and their consequence, had Madison in 1812 granted to Astor the permission to arm a vessel in his defence, the posto at Astoria would undoubtedly have maintained itself throughout the war. Failing in this, had Madison in 1816 given to Astor the protection of the flag and a squad of soldiers, the Astoria post would have been re-established. Monroe done this when the appeal was made in 1817, the same thing country, which lasted till 1846, when she withdrew from the region south of the forty-ninth parallel, would have been averted, and our claim would never have been seriously disputed.
