Fifty-five years ago he was married. Surviving are his wife and two daughters and four sons—Mrs. C. Lewis and Mrs. E. Redden—Kingston; John, William, James and George, of Portsmouth. By his death Portsmouth has lost one of her best and oldest citizens.
