MOROCCO BRIGANDS RE-TREAT INTO MOUNTAINS

Warships Under Orders—Two Squadrons Will Go To Tangier To Aid in Hunt for Kidnapped Men.

Washington, May 21.—Mr. Perdicaris, the wealthy American resident of Tangier, Morocco and his stepson, a British subject, who were captured by brigands, were carried into the mountains where pursuit is almost impossible. The state department has been advised to this effect by Mr. Gummere, United States consul-general at Tangier. He also reports that no terms have been received from the brigand chief.

Mr. Gummere says the Moorish authorities are assisting in every way they can and adds that a war vessel will be of great assistance. He asks for a big one.

Acting Secretary Loomis has instructed Consul Gummere to demand of the Moorish government that it take sweeping measures to procure the release of Mr. Perdicaris even if necessary to accede to the terms of the brigands.

Admiral Chadwick when he reaches Fayal, will receive orders to proceed with the whole south squadron to Tangiers, while Admiral Jewell, with the newly-formed European squadron, who is about three days behind Admiral Chadwick, will be ordered to follow to Tangier, if the emergency still exists.

JAPANESE RETREAT.

Dislodged From Four Positions Covering Fifteen Miles. St. Petersburg, May 21.—The following despatch from General Kouropatkin to the emperor, dated Liao-Yang, May 19th, has been received:

"A detachment of Cossacks engaged a detachment of the Japanese advance guard on May 18th, north of Feng Wang Cheng, in a mountainous district. The fight began in the morning and lasted until 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

"The Japanese were successfully dislodged from four positions, extending over fifteen miles. The pursuit of the Japanese was stopped at Datansty, thirteen miles north of Feng Wang Cheng.

"Our casualties were six Cossacks wounded, two horses killed and eight horses wounded. There is no trace of the enemy in the Valley of Teanhoka, as far as the road leading to the Tchanguang Pass, eighteen miles north of Feng Wang Cheng, or in the valley of the Li river from the station to Kuan Dian San on the road to Dou Sian Lintan.

"A squadron of Japanese cavalry which left Kuan Dian San on May 17th, for Saimatai was repulsed by one of our patrols at Schoago, twelve miles from Kuan Dian San. The patrol retired without loss.

"Japanese infantry, two thousand strong, advanced May 15th, toward Salitszipudza, which was evacuated May 16th.

Taken By Storm. Chicago, May 21.—A special to the Daily News from Tokio says: "Port Arthur is to be taken by storm the moment proper preparations have been completed. Siege guns have been placed in position and the land forces appointed for the assault have to be strengthened.

"The unexpected loss of two fine vessels has emphasized the insecurity of sea power, and the authorities feel that no chance must be taken that would encourage Russia to send out the Baltic fleet counting on finding a harbor of refuge in Port Arthur.

"It is realized that the storming of the fortress will inevitably cost many lives, but it is considered that the land forces appointed for the assault have to be strengthened.

CONTRACT GIVEN MARCONI. Seven Wireless Stations To Protect Shipping. Montreal, May 21.—The Dominion government, through Hon. Mr. Prefontaine, minister of marine and fisheries, has signed a contract with the Marconi Telegraph company for the establishment of seven stations at the mouth of the St. Lawrence. The contract calls for the completion of the seven stations by April 1st, 1905. F. W. Fishback, manager of the company, said that the first four stations to be erected would be Fame Point, Health Point, Point Amour, and Belle Isle. These four stations would be completed and placed in operation by July 31st. The three remaining stations would be at Cape Race, Sable Island, and a point near Capso.

ASTOR'S TROUBLES.

His Hotel Near Church And Cannot Sell Liquor.

Special to the Whig May 21.—John Jacob Astor is having his troubles. He built the St Regis, a magnificent hotel, at the corner of Fifth avenue and Forty-first street, and it is now completed, but it is doubtful whether it will ever be used for hotel purposes.

By an oversight the building was erected within two hundred feet of a church and, for that reason, cannot obtain a liquor license under the laws. It is strongly doubted that Mr. Astor will be able to secure the consent of the church people, and the owners of private residences within the same limit.

Even if he should get the consent of the church people, the owners of private residences would bar his way. It is known that they are greatly incensed over the bold action of Mr. Astor, in erecting a skyscraper within the sacred precincts of Fifth avenue.

They were furious when they learned of Mr. Astor's plan and how they have a chance to get even. As these neighbors are, without exception wealthy, they cannot well be bought out or pacified by any money consideration. Society is curious, how Mr. Astor will manage to crawl out of the tight place in which he finds himself just now. To run a hotel without a liquor license, it is everybody admits a practical impossibility.

BLACK SEA FLEET READY.

Turkey May Let Vessels Pass Dardanelles. London, May 21.—The Odessa correspondent of the Central News wires that the whole of the Russian Black Sea fleet has been ordered to be held on a complete standby from August 1st. In the meanwhile the fleet is divided into two squadrons which are executing a series of practical evolutions in Crimean waters.
