BRISK BATTLE

RUSS KILLED 1,000 JAPS IN SORTIE.

Russian Losses Were Only 116 Killed or Wounded, According To Stoesel—The Late News From The East.

St. Petersburg, May 21.—(6.28 p. m.)—The government to-day received news, corroborating the rumors in circulation here, that Gen. Stoesel made a successful sortie from Port Arthur, resulting in the defeat of the Japanese, with the loss of over 1,000 killed or wounded. The Russian losses were 116 killed or wounded.

Paris, May 21.—The Petit Journal's St. Petersburg correspondent says he has been permitted to visit the Novsky shipyards, and saw there six submarine boats, two of which were complete, and are to start for Vladivostok within a week.

Tokio, May 21.—Although it has not been officially reported, it is said on good authority that the Japanese forces have captured Kaichow, driving the Russians back to Tashichin, in the direction of New Chwang, and preventing the advance of the Russian troops at New Chwang in the direction of Kaichow.

Tokio, May 21.—(5 p. m.)—The Japanese forces, which landed at Takushan on Thursday, surrounded and routed a force of Russian cavalry at 7 o'clock on Friday evening in the neighborhood of Wangchitun, seven miles north of Takushan. The Russian force, which consisted of about one squadron, lost many men killed or wounded, as well as a captain, who was captured. The Japanese sustained no losses.

Liao Yang, May 21.—The Japanese plan of campaign is puzzling the Russian authorities. The Japanese appear and then vanish. It is impossible to gauge the strength of the troops they have landed, as they are scattered and are occupying elevated positions in the mountains.

Tokio, May 21.—It is absolutely certain that the battleship Hatsuse was sunk by a Russian mine ten miles off the coast. The position of these mines make navigation dangerous for neutral vessels and a protest from foreign governments is expected. The loss of the Japanese warship is felt keenly here. No flags are flying in this city and the nightly lantern parades have been abandoned.
