A Creole Lad Has Been Changed.

New Orleans, May 27.—For the first time in history, it is said a leper will be ordered from the Lazzaretto completely cured. This week Louisiana Lepers home at Indian Camp will discharge one of its patients, a Creole boy, a native of New Orleans, aged fifteen, who has been afflicted with leprosy for four years and has been under treatment at Indian Camp for three years. When he went to the asylum his body was the color of coffee and covered with leprous ulcers. His face was blotched and pumkered up with open sores; he had no eyebrows nor eye lashes. Now he is clean to look at; his face is clear, with a slight touch of color; his eyebrows and eye-lashes have grown; his eye is clear instead of glassy, and he has regained control of his facial muscles. Five more patients are on the road to recovery, and will be discharged within a year.
