## THE FASHIONS.

BEAUTIFUL GOWNS, BEWITCHING HATS.

Striking Feature of Spring Modes Is The Variety of Colors—Unlined Blouses Warm—Voile and Taffeta Prime Favorites.

New York, May 28.—Spring has not yet fairly begun, but during the past week there have been at least a few comfortably warm and clear days. Only those who have lived in New York and have made a study of observing fashions, fully appreciate what a magic change the first few warm days of real spring weather will produce in the appearance of Fifth avenue and other aristocratic thoroughfares in the vicinity of Central park. The magnificent display of beautiful gowns, bewitching hats and stunning coats or jackets on such days reminds one vividly of the dazzling sights of a balmy spring day on the Paris boulevards or the promenades at Nice or Monte Carlo. It is safe to say that never before has there been such a remarkable variety of styles and designs in gowns, waists, jackets, coats, hats and such a bewildering display of colors than this year. More than at any other time is there liberty allowed to individual originality and although certain simple rules are generally conformed with, there is less of the monotonous sameness than ever before.

One of the most striking features of

the fashion displays is the great variety of colors shown. Among the most favored are various shades of pink and pinkish mauve, all kinds of blues, from the palest to the darkest, with some special shades, like hydrangea and hyacinth, the dainty and delicate willow, and almond greens, the ever popular cerise and, last but not least, the various tints of white. Light grays are used to some extent, but by no means as much as in former years. The same may be said of the various tones of champagne color, which was so extremely popular last year. Among the reds there are a few particularly favored shades, like coral, fruit and American beauty. Browns are as popular as ever, the reason being, probably, that brown is becoming to nearly every combination of complexion, hair and eyes. There is only one objection to it, it is not particularly suited for hot weather, as it absorbs too much heat and also looks too warm.

Unlined blouses are worn a great deal with dressy skirt and coat costumes nowadays and there is none more popular and becoming than the blouse of batiste, trimmed with bayonet embroidery or with a combination of embroidery and lace. Some exquisite specimens have been shown recently and they seem to be even more popular than lace blouses, for those of fine lawn embroidery with lace trimmings.

There is nothing prettier and daintier in the line of negligee than the garters after the Japanese pattern, which are displayed in the shops at this time. The main feature of the Japanese style are retained, but they are modified to adapt them to our conditions and the requirements of American methods of wearing these garments. It is difficult to imagine anything more artistic and delightful than these kimono robes, saks, and wrappers, which are equally beautiful in color, design and workmanship. In most cases soft crepe is the material of which they are made and on the crepe beautiful designs of doves, birds or butterflies are embroidered by skillful hands. The combinations of colors are charming and characteristically Japanese. Most of these summer negligees are cut rather low, but the necks are either round, pointed or square. There seems to be no rule in regard to particularly popular, probably because they are more becoming to various forms and shapes of necks.

Soft finished taffeta is also used quite extensively for summer negligees, although it lacks the clinging softness and pliability which makes the softer crepes such delightful material for negligee purposes. Some of these taffeta negligees are in the form of outer robes, which are worn with a gridled under robe of soft and sheer material. These robes are quite handsome and picturesque, though less convenient than those made in one piece.

Negligees in imitation of Japanese styles do not exclusively dominate the field of fashions in negligee costumes, however. Many women of taste prefer the French negligees in sheer linerie, trimmed with batiste or Swiss embroideries or with lace and decorated with fine handwork, in the form of trailing embroidery, delicate tucks, insertions, etc. Some exquisitely beautiful specimens of such negligees are shown in the shops. Some of them are marvels of workmanship and artistic elaboration and their price amounts to a small fortune.

Many of the lingerie negligees are

constructed upon the general idea of the empire style. The short waisted robes are gathered in just below the bust, where they are finished with a ribbon or embroidery girde. From that point they hang in straight folds to the ground. Some of them are entirely untripped in the lower part, excepting perhaps, a deep hem, while others have one or more lines of creases at the bottom, which cause the gown to fall in more graceful lines. These flounces also have a tendency to better preserve the general contour of the drapery.

One of the most fashionable new materials in Paris is what taffeta and so great is the beauty of the material and so manifold are its advantages, that it will undoubtedly become equally popular here. The taffeta used is of the softest quality, which is rather an important condition, as the stiffer material is not particularly adapted for the most severe styles of tailor made, but is well adapted to full belted, plaited skirts and loose, short sleeves.

For dressy afternoon frocks voile and taffeta are probably the most favored materials. Next in order come the crepes, collians, chignons, batistes, mousselines and fine cloths. They all have their special missions and are shown in the shops in a bewildering variety of styles and colors. For daily summer wear there are also many other favored materials, like white and natural colored pongee, a

secret of weaves in linens and other materials.

Women with an eye to economy will be glad to read the following suggestion by a writer on fashion matters: A pair of lace medallions, left over from last year's summer frock can be put to excellent use in trimming stockings to match the gown. For instance, a plain pair of tan lisle stockings can be made very smart by the use of medallions, one just above each instep.

They are first applied on the stockings with silk thread in very fine stitches, then the lisle beneath is carefully cut away and the sides of the stockings secured with button-hole stitches placed closely and finely to the wrong side of the medallion. Worn with brown suede shoes they give a dainty finishing touch to the costume.

The excessive monotony of the big pompadour is, fortunately going out of style and women are gradually regaining to a saner and less ugly style of dressing the hair. Now comes the time when the women who were foolish enough to follow that abominable fashion, will have occasion to regret their foolishness. Complaints are beginning to come from all sides and more are sure to come, as the pompadour becomes a nightmare of the past. At present fashion decrees that the hair shall be parted in the middle and gently waved on either side. That is just where the trouble begins, for those who have been wearing pompadours during the past year. Newly all of them find that their hair, just where it should be fully shown, wears or less overtaken signs of baldness.
