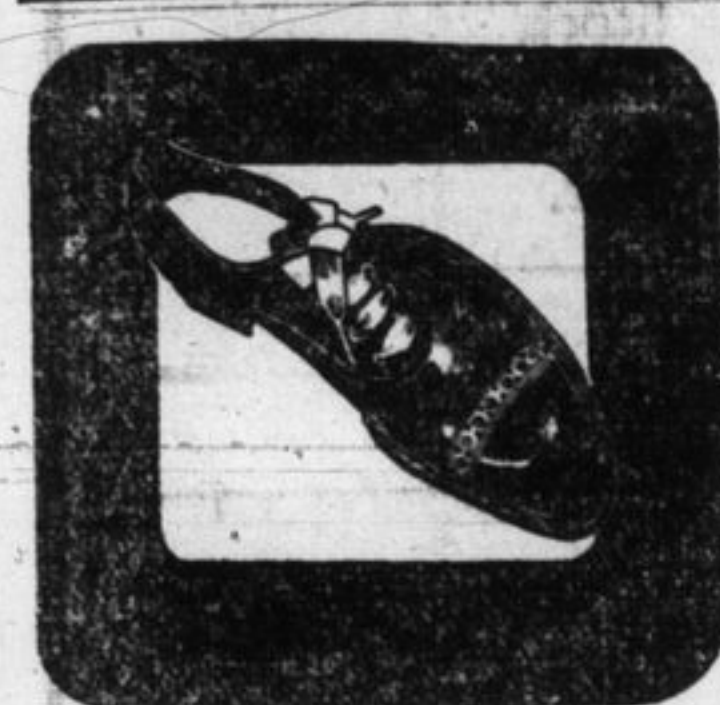

synod will meet next year in the old historic city of Quebec. resignation of Bishop. The church in Canada has met with a great loss by the resignation of Bishop Courtney, of Nova Scotia, whose ability and eloquence have been held by her in high esteem.

The Trust Funds. I wish to draw the attention of the members of synod to the condition of our widows and orphan's and superannuation funds. Surely the church will not continue to stand and do nothing for these funds. This has been her position for years. The widows and orphan's fund will soon be bankrupt if nothing is done and payments from it will have to be stopped. The overdraft has now reached a sum within twenty per cent of the amount of our capital. It is perfectly plain from the efforts received, that strong appeals are not made by the clergy for this fund.

Death of The Primate. The death of the primate on March 9th, removed from the church in Canada a most distinguished and conspicuous figure, who had "the head of a statesman and the heart of a saint." The Most Rev. Robert Machar, D.D., L.L.D., D.C.L., primate of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, was a ripe scholar and a born leader of men. He was a graduate of Aberdeen University, and carried off the highest prizes from both universities. He was consecrated Bishop of Rupert's Land, by the Archbishop of Canterbury, in Lambeth chapel in 1865, and was the primate of the diocese of Rupert's Land, which included the dioceses of Alberta, of the diocese of Alberta, to Frankville; Rev. E. Lawlor, M.A., of the diocese of Algoma, was appointed to Wellington and Gore; Rev. A. L. Gwyn, who had been taking service at Wellington, was appointed to Shannonville; Rev. W. C. Cude, B.A., was appointed to the new parish that I formed at Madoc, Queensborough and the Rockies.
