Memorial Service For Miss Dougall—Canada Northern Earnings.

Special to the Whig. Toronto, June 2.—Charles E. Burke was found guilty in a city police court for attempting to assist Quackenbush, a burglar, to escape from the Central prison. Burke was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

Harry A. Forgie, New York, pleaded guilty in to-day's police court to the charge of bigamy, laid against him by his second wife, Flora D. Hill. He was sentenced to nine months in prison.

NO EXTENSION.

Of The Three Mile Limit Is Proposed.

London, June 2.—Earl Percy, under secretary of state for foreign affairs, replying to a question in the House of Commons, to-day, said that no report had been made to Russia or Japan regarding placing naval mines in the far east, outside of territorial limits. The subject, he added, was receiving the careful attention of the government. Asked if in view of the increased range of modern projectiles the government was prepared to recommend any extension of the three mile limit, Earl Percy answered in the negative.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

A Man Was Crushed Beneath Cars.

Special to the Whig. Tweed, Ont., June 2.—Bert Carr, a resident of this place met with a terrible and probably fatal accident about eleven o'clock last night. In some unaccountable way he got beneath some Bay of Quinte railway cars that were being shunted and was run over. Both legs were so badly mangled that they must be amputated. Carr is about thirty-five years of age, and has a wife and three children. The unfortunate man was taken to Peterboro hospital on the early morning train.

CHOOSE A CANDIDATE.

Convention At Tweed Selects Deroche.

Tweed, Ont., June 2.—The liberal convention for East Hastings met here yesterday to choose a candidate for the House of Commons. Mr. Clare, Hungerford, and G. E. Perroche, Dorovento, were the candidates for nomination. Mr. Clare received thirty-seven votes, and Mr. Deroche, seventy-eight. Mr. Deroche was then made the unanimous choice of the convention.

The British minister at Tangier is co-operating with the French minister in the endeavor to secure the release of Messrs. Perdicaris and Varley.

The great lakes' strike is being broken up. On Wednesday a fleet of five vessels cleared from Buffalo for the upper lakes.

The announcement is made that China has become a signatory to the Geneva convention, which governs the rules of civilized warfare.
