PAVING PRINCESS STREET.

At the council meeting last evening it was suggested that Princess street, at least that portion of it which is now being double-tracked, be paved with bitulithite or asphalt. But it was answered that this could not now be contemplated and for three very important reasons. The railway track has to be laid in a bed of cement or concrete, the pavement cannot be laid without a plan for the purpose, and the street cannot be left in a torn-up condition, to the injury of those who do business on the block. The paving of a street has to be undertaken cautiously. Before such a thing can be thought of the drains, water and gas pipes, as well as the street railway have to be thought of. Unless this is done there will be digging up and excavating and the result will be the destruction of the surface of the street.

CLAMOURING FOR RECOGNITION.

Because Mr. McLean will not be ignored upon the public ownership question, and has referred with lofty disdain to some conservative papers who formerly opposed the principle, he has been severely called to task. The World said the Ottawa Citizen had been steadily opposed to government ownership of railways, or had wavered in its support thereof, and the Citizen has replied that it is "the champion crank journal of the country." The World, it is admitted, made a specialty of government ownership of railways, and when events led to the adoption of it by Mr. Borden the World "did all it could to obstruct the forward movement." Now that is the essence of meanness. Mr. McLean is not doing government ownership an injury. No man could work harder for it and with greater zeal and devotion.

The sick wards of the Philadelphia hospitals have been connected with some of the churches, and the patients are so permitted to enjoy the music and the sermons. This has been referred to as "a peculiarly beautiful ministry," and one "deserving of imitation everywhere." The society in London that has undertaken the making of men and women for the improvement of the human race, leaving love out of account, has undertaken a most difficult contract. Cupid has never been hindered or hedged in his operations by science and will not be embarrassed by it now.

Dr. Campbell, who has resigned because Prof. Scriver, who was once his pupil, has passed over him and become the principal of the Montreal Presbyterian College. Dr. Campbell is not the first man who has been surpassed in brilliancy by a younger man, and a student under him. He ought not to be offended on that account.

Major-General Hutton. London, June 7.—The Westminster Gazette says Major-General Hutton's conflict with Senator Neild is not the first of the kind the general has had. Some time ago Gen. Hutton tried to compel the editor of the Melbourne Evening Herald to disclose the name of a writer of military articles and he was sharply wrapped on the knuckles by the minister of defence, who pointed out that no journalist could be a citizen soldier if he were held accountable for military opinions expressed in a paper with which he happened to be connected.

STANDING FOR PRINCIPLE.

Principle is asserting itself, and properly enough it is finding special recognition in the churches. The Baptists of the west took exception to the granting of a bonus by the people of St. Thomas to Alma College, on the ground that denominational institutions should not be claimants for aid from a fund to which all the taxpayers must contribute. Singularly enough and somewhat unexpectedly, the Methodists do not approve of the St. Thomas case. The Montreal conference has passed a resolution which reads as follows: "That the conference has learned with regret that at St. Thomas an institution owned and controlled by the Methodist church has been willing to receive a grant of public funds. While not expressing any opinion as to the action of the college authorities in the matter, this conference places itself on record as deprecating any recognition of the principle of diversion of public funds contributed under compulsion by the members of all religious faiths for the accomplishment of denominational purposes." The discussion of the matter was of a lively character. Alma College was in need of assistance, and an appeal was made to the people for a municipal grant. The plea was offered that the money was wanted for building purposes, for the extension of the college in accommodation and usefulness. Once the proposal was defeated, the people did not understand that Alma

might be removed to Toronto and receive there the management which it desired. A second vote was successful, the amount asked for being smaller.

The argument in conference was that purely denominational institutions should stand upon their merits, that at least they should not expect aid from the city treasury. Entanglements on the educational question were not desired, and as between Ottawa and Kingston, and their respective attitudes on the college question, the example of Ottawa was commended. There the university was destroyed by fire. The temptation was to solicit a public grant for building purposes. But it was decided to proceed without this, and the contributions of the people, in consequence, are said to be most generous.

The Montreal conference has spoken directly and emphatically on a great issue, and its voice will be heard in every hamlet in the land. Principle is the only thing the church can depend on in a case of this kind.

THE RETURNS MADE.

Statistical Report of the Conference. Peterboro, June 7.—The City of Quinte Methodist Conference will meet in Picton this year. The report of the statistical committee, showed that the church membership during the past year was 40,259, the total Sunday school force, 39,111, and the total membership, 80,370. The total missionary fundings were \$28,626, the bi-centenary, \$4,543, the educational, \$2,118, the temperance, \$419, the Epworth League, \$225, the contingent, \$529, the union church relief, \$375, the Sunday school aid, \$354, the station, \$469, and the woman's missionary society, \$9,344, with an increase of \$1,122. The total amount contributed by Sunday schools was \$22,114, and by young people's societies, \$7,823. The total amount raised for ministerial support was \$100,205. The average salary to married men, not including horse keep, was \$655.55; to single ordained men, \$413.35; to probationers, \$295.62.
