### IT WAS PUT BENEATH A STA-TION PLATFORM.

Cripple Creek, Colo., June 7.—An infernal machine, placed beneath the platform of the Independence station of the Florence and Cripple Creek railroad by the instigators of a nefarious plot, was touched off early Monlay morning as a crowd of non-union miners were passing over the place, sending twelve of the laborers into eternity and maiming a dozen others. SLEW THREE AND THEN

ENDS HIS LIFE. N.J., Murders Two on One Day And Finishes Crime The Next - One Child Escapes Roselle, N.J., June 7.-After killing hree of his children and wounding a fourth, Joseph M, Pouch, at one time

Pouch lived in a little village with his four children. Sunday he shot two of them and embalmed their bodies. By all Grocers. He took other two to an upper room with him. Meanwhile he had mailed a warning to County Physician Westcott, who upon receiving the letter, notified the police. When the officials knocked at the door of the Pouch cottage Monday, Pouch shot and killed his little daughter and wounded his sole remaining son. He then shot himself and died as the police forced an entrance. The boy will recover. Pouch is believed to have been insane Pouch, who was about fifty-two undertaker in Brooklyn. When the elder Pouch died years ago, he is said to have left his entire estate to a bro ther of the central figure in the trag edy. Pouch had been twice married.
The first wife obtained a divorce and his second wide died two months ago. Since her death Pouch had been despodent. Monday he mailed a letter to County Physician Westcott informing went to the house. When they knocked at the door there was a few seconds of silence and then three shots were heard in the front room upstairs. The two officers broke down the door and went up stairs, where they came up on the body of Pouch. He was still breathing, but gasped his last within a few seconds.

In the far corner of the room wa found Albert Pouch, ten years old. with a bullet in his right side. He was alive but unconscious. Beside him lav the body of his sister Minnie, five years old, who was shot in the breast. Albert was hurried to the hospital, where the bullet was extracted and his

chances of recovery are excellent. Meanwhile the police in exploring the house found in a room on the first floor, laid out as if by an undertaker, the white clad corpses of two little daughters of Pouch. They were Lillian, aged seven years, and Grace aged

Their mouths were burned with carbolic acid, and on their throats were the mouths by their father, they had been choked. They had been dead at least twenty-four hours.

Albert says that Sunday morning his father took Lillian and Grace into the room where their bodies were found and sent Minnie and himself to the upper part of the house. Albert never saw Lillian and Grace again and does not vet know their fate! He says his father told him he had locked them in the back room. Albert and Minnie remained locked in the front room Sunday afternoon and night and Monday. Most of the time their father

was with them. Albert says that he and his sister were seated in a corner. He thinks his sister was asleep leaning against him when there came a rapping on the front door. His father arose from his chair and shot them both.


