MADE BY THE POLICE IN A FORT TOWER.

Stolen Ammunition Galore Was Found in a Fort Dungeon-Dr. Anglin's Bicycle Recovered-Brought Booty to The City. The police made a remarkable haul

of the fortilications opposite Cedar Island. Several young men who had been taking a Sunday stroll reported that under the floor, in a dungeonlike place, they had seen a large quantity of ammunition, a bicycle and other articles. 
