



Kouropatkin was the recall of the Russian forces from Korea and the removal of military headquarters from Port Arthur to Harbin. When the Japanese began their march on the lower end of the Liao-Tung spur of Manchuria, troops were ordered to retire north on Kouropatkin's main line, except 3,000 infantry, who were hurriedly thrown into Port Arthur to aid the regular garrison in case of a Japanese attempt to capture Port Arthur.
