A DARK CITY WILL BE KINGSTON'S LOT AFTER JULY 1ST.

City Council To Terminate Street Lighting Contract—Settlement With Light, Heat And Power Company Failed.

The city will be in darkness after July 1st, unless the difficulty regarding the taking over of the lighting plant is settled by that time. At last night's meeting of the city council, it was decided to terminate the street lighting contract with the Light, Heat & Power company on that date.

On behalf of the fire and light committee, Ald. Toye presented the following report to council last night: "That the street lighting contract with the Kingston Light, Heat & Power company is at an end, and that they cannot recommend that the lighting of the streets by the company be continued beyond July 1st next, and that the city solicitor be instructed to notify the company to that effect."

The only question upon the report was raised by Ald. King who asked if the city was legally entitled to terminate the contract. City Solicitor McIntyre replied in the affirmative, and the adoption of the report was carried unanimously without further discussion.

How the Matter Stands. City Solicitor McIntyre wrote a letter to the council last night explaining how the lighting plant question stood. Part of it was as follows: "Only one proceeding was open to the city to secure the freeing of the lands from the encumbrance, and that a proceeding under chap. 119, sec. 15 and 16 R.S.O., 1897. The weakness of our position in proceeding under this act was that the act left it entirely discretionary with the court to grant the relief asked—the act reading: 'the court may if it thinks fit' grant an order, etc. Although I could not apply to the court as a matter of right for this relief, I thought the advantage to the city in meeting the works free from encumbrance, and the cost to warrant the risk of failure, especially as failure in that application would in no way affect our general rights under the agreement. The council is fully aware that after two postponements the application of the city was dismissed with costs. The costs will not amount to much as the application was to a judge in chambers."

"The city is now face to face with the situation that the works must be taken over under the encumbrance maturing in 1917, and in the meantime bearing interest at five per cent. per annum. As the city can borrow money at four per cent., and has arranged to do this under the by-law passed in possession of the city, the question is thus raised regarding acquiring the works at the expense of the city, namely, who shall bear the excess of interest."

"The matter is still further complicated by the fact that as required by an agreement the city has passed a by-law to raise the whole purchase money. Under the law, the whole of the debentures must be issued within two years from March 28th last, the date of the passing of the by-law. If this by-law is acted under and the whole of the purchase money raised at once by the issue of debentures, the city will have a hand \$299,975 till 1917 when the company's bonds may be retired. In the interval this large sum of money may produce only three per cent. in the bank, while the city is paying on the bonds of the company five per cent. for some twelve years. Who should bear this excess interest? In my judgment there is only one answer to this question—the company."

"Unless these questions are adjusted amicably between the city and company next, then the only course open is an action, for specific performance of the contract and for possession of the works."

Unable To Agree. Ald. Meek asked if there was to be a settlement of the question. Ald. Toye replied that the fire and light committee had been unable to come to any agreement regarding a settlement with the company, and had instructed the city solicitor to proceed in accordance with the plan outlined by Mr. Aylesworth, of Toronto.
