FRANK HOLTMAN CONFESSES. Clarence Myers Murdered By Himself And Mrs. Myers. Walla, Walla, Wash., July 8.—Frank Holtman, under arrest for the murder of Clarence Myers, of Kansas City, has confessed, Holtman said: "Five years ago, Myers and I have been friends. She loved me and I loved her, and we wanted to get married. We planned the murder three weeks or more before the crime. 'The night of May 10th, I went to Mrs. Myers at three o'clock. I met Mrs. Myers at the house, and the two of us went to Myers' bedroom. It was apparently asleep, but just as we entered he called out: 'Well, you here again.' He grabbed at me, and as he did so I struck him with my club, the billiard cue. Then I held him while his wife cut his throat with his own razor. 'After the crime I went to my room and after stopping a while I went to the depot and left town. Mrs. Myers gave me \$10 to get away on.'

New Russian Loan. Berlin, July 8.—It is reported that M. Witte, the Russian ex-minister of finance, will soon arrive here. Russia has expressed her willingness to grant Germany's demands in regard to a new commercial treaty. In return, it is said M. Witte will be enabled to negotiate a new Russian loan with Berlin financiers.

LITTLE NEWS And That Only From Chinese Sources. DRAWING NEAR. ADMIRAL TOGO COVERS THE ARMY'S ADVANCES.

The Japanese Said To Be Only Six Miles From The Fortress—Russians Were Winning When The Japanese Secured Reinforcements. Special to the Whig. London, July 8.—What little news is available, in reference to Port Arthur, comes from Chinese refugees at Chefoo. According to the doubtful evidence, the Japanese occupy the heights surrounding the fortress and are fortifying Lung-Wang-Tung, six miles to the east, Wolfe Mountain, five miles to the north-east, and other points completing their cordon around the place. According to these statements as true the critics here forecast the speedy end of Russian resistance, declaring that the harbor ships and forts will be all at the mercy of the Japanese artillery. The Japanese hold the fortress, the Japanese hold Hwangmichun and Sansung, seven and eight miles north of Port Arthur, having captured them on June 30th.

Completed The Conquest. Chefoo, July 8.—Chinese report that the Japanese completed their conquest of the Lung-Wang-Tung position, on July 7th, the Russians losing one hundred killed and forty wounded. The Russians employed coolies to carry off their dead and wounded. During the fighting fifty coolies were killed.

To Await Instructions. Tokio, July 4.—The Chinese government has telegraphed to Yuen, Taitai of Mukden, and Gen. Ma, commanding the Chinese troops in Manchuria, that the neutral zone includes Mongolia, and the territory west of the Liao River, and ordering them should an emergency occur to await instructions from Peking.

The Russians Won. St. Petersburg, July 8.—A despatch to the Vedomosti, from Tashchino, reports a fierce fight on July 6th, in which the Russians, under Gen. Samsonoff, drove the Japanese from before Kaiping in the direction of Senyuchen, the Cossacks causing havoc among the enemy's reinforcements for the Japanese approaching the Russians were obliged to withdraw. The correspondent says that Gen. Samsonoff's division is stationed southeast of Kaiping, and Gen. Mischeff's Cossacks are east of Kaiping. The Japanese main body is at Siyuen and before Kaiping. Their attack probably will be made along the Siyuen-Tasho line.

Small Damage. But It Caused Quite a Fright. Montreal, July 8.—The Richelieu ferry steamer Longueuil collided with a scow near her wharf in the river, today, and caused a good deal of excitement among the passengers of the steamer. Some thinking the boat might sink quickly, donned life-belts, but fortunately they were not needed, and the amount of damage was comparatively small.

Killed In Cyclone. Reno, Nev., July 8.—A message from Hobart, says that a tornado visited Clinton, in Custer county, yesterday. Several dwellings were wrecked and eight persons killed.

A FAST LINE. Still Hoping for It On Atlantic. MAKE RECORDS. THE STEAMSHIPS THE ALLANS WILL RUN. The Members May Take In A Trip To The Winnipeg Exhibition—British Colonies Added To Those To Enjoy The Preferential Tariff.

Expel Missionaries. Berlin, July 8.—Official information indicates that the Congo Free State has decided to expel all American and European missionaries from the land, on the ground that they incite the natives to insubordination and spread exaggerated accounts of atrocities throughout the world. Fifty-eight Americans are involved in the wholesale expulsions. Should the scheme of expulsion be carried out the Belgians will then have a clear way to maltreat the natives unchecked by any other government.

TOUR OF COMMISSION. Prof. Shortt Is At Present In Chicago. Special to the Whig. Toronto, July 8.—H. J. John Redmond To Attend. Special to the Whig. New York, July 9.—Great preparations are being made for the Irish convention which is to be held here next month. John Redmond and several members of the parliamentary party are expected to attend. The United Irish League, under whose auspices the gathering will take place, has made arrangements for a great public meeting on August 28th with Carnegie music hall. The local committee on arrangements is composed of many prominent men, clerical and lay, and it is said that this will be one of the most important events in Irish-American circles in many years.

Built By Hamburg-American Steamship Co. London, July 8.—The Hamburg-American steamship company is about to add to its fleet a vessel of 25,000 tons, to be built at Stettin, and another of 22,000 tons to be built by Harland & Wolff of Belfast. The former steamer will be fitted with a restaurant where passengers, not caring for the table d'hote, can order meals when they please, paying separately for their passage and meals.

Nineteen Picked Up. London, July 8.—Word was received today, that nineteen more of the survivors of the steamer Norge had been picked up and landed at Thorshaven, the capital of the Farro Islands. See our corsets, 65c., worth \$1. New York Dress Reform.

A LATE RUMOR. That Russia Won In A Naval Contest. St. Petersburg, July 8.—A special despatch from New Chwang, dated yesterday, says Gen. Kuroki and adds that Japanese officers are organizing Chinese handit bands throughout the Liao Valley for an attack on Mukden. A special despatch from Liao Yang, under yesterday's date, says that a persistent rumor is current there to the effect that a naval engagement has occurred at Port Arthur in which two Japanese warships participated, resulting in a Russian victory. A similar report was current at Liao Yang, July 5th, the location of the engagement then being given as northward of Gensan, Korea.

An Unlikely Story. Paris, July 8.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Echo de Paris, telegraphs that the Vladivostok squadron attacked Gensan, a squadron of Japanese torpedo boats protecting a cruiser, which was searching for Russian warships. A Japanese destroyer was captured, and has been brought to Vladivostok. It is stated that a Japanese transport, two Japanese torpedo boats and the Japanese cruiser were sunk.

What Is Claimed. Chefoo, July 8.—A trustworthy Chinese who has arrived here from Port Arthur, reports that fort No. 16, of the main line of defense, was captured by the Japanese on Wednesday. The Japanese, he says, have now reached the north-east slope of Takushan mountains, where the slope is less than three miles from Port Arthur. A message from Russian sources states that Russian officials claim to have wiped out three Japanese regiments last week.

Troops' Health Good. London, July 8.—A despatch to the Times from Tokio says that news from Gen. Oku's army, while the health of the troops is excellent. All the bridges between Palandun and Wafangtien have been repaired and trains are running. The Russian horses are said to be dying from glanders at the rate of 200 daily.

HUGE LAKE OF FLAMES. Destruction of Large Properties Is Threatened. Lander, Wyo., July 8.—The keeper of the Beldo-American oil property southeast of Yellowstone, while burning surplus oil that escaped from the wells, swept down a small rivulet that communicates with lakes 100 feet from the wells. Immediately a vast volume of flames leaped hundreds of feet high. The burning lake is close to two more, and should the wind change, they too, probably will catch fire. If the fire reaches these two lakes it will mean a total loss of at least 500,000 barrels of oil as well as the destruction of all machinery and derricks. The gravest apprehensions are felt.
