THE CAMPBELL PROPOSITION. The aldermen of Kingston, which recently bought out the local light company, do not care to allow the Kingston Mills electric plant to enter into competition with the civic industry.

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JAP'S STRENGTH

FOUR ARMY CORPS IN THE FIELD. Marquis Oyama is to have the Japanese Command At An Early Date—Some 160,000 Fighting Men.

London, July 8.—There are four Japanese armies now in the field, three of which are acting in co-operation in the general advance against Gen. Kouropatkin in Manchuria, leaving the fourth engaged in the siege of Port Arthur.

The first army, Gen. Kuroki's, is that which was disembarked at Chemulpo between February 28th and March 1st, consisting of 22,500 men—17,000 combatants and 5,500 coolies.

The second army, under Gen. Oku, is that which was landed at Pitsow and Jashereh on the Liao-Tung peninsula. After obtaining possession of Kowsho and the neck of the peninsula by the battle of Nanshan, this army was divided into two divisions and possibly another being entrusted as the fourth army, under Gen. Nogi, while the first, third, and fifth divisions.

Including the seventh, eighth and ninth divisions, the location of which is not certain, this accounts for all the thirteen divisions of the Japanese army. Roughly speaking, the strength of a Japanese division, combatants and non-combatants, is 25,000.

It has been reported that the reserve battalions of each division have also been sent into the field. This adds fifty-two battalions, seven hundred and eleven companies, 9,000 men, making a total of fighting men 228,300 rank and file and 8,500 officers.

Allowing for troops guarding communications, garrisons and 50,000 engaged at Port Arthur this would give 150,000 men, or 160,000 approximately, as opposed to the Russian army at Gen. Kouropatkin's disposal.

Pastor In Pajamas Marries Elopers. New York, July 8.—Rev. William S. Newson, of Calicut, N.J., performed a hasty marriage ceremony in the face of many obstacles and a pair of enraged parents early yesterday morning.

Mr. Newson suggested that they give him time to exchange his pajamas for street clothes, but the young couple clung to his arms and begged him not to go until the knot had been tied.

"Listen," said the young woman, "don't you hear them coming?" And listening, Mr. Newson certainly did hear the pounding of horses' hoofs and the rattle of a buckboard.

So he did not hesitate, but in the hall lit only by the moon, he recited the Methodist ritual, and the young woman had just said "Yes" when the buckboard stopped in front of the door and an irate, middle-aged couple bounded up the walk.

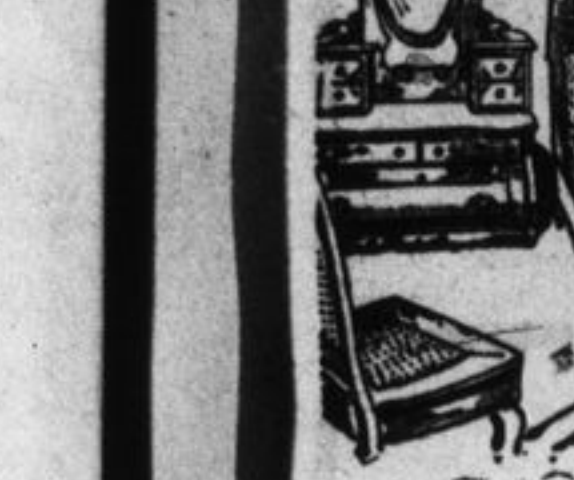
