FACE TO FACE

The Armies in Banks of the Liank

ARE ALL READY TO ENGAGE IN THE MIGHTY DEATH GRAPPLE.

Finding General Keller's Headquarters—His Army is Anxious For The Meeting With Kuraki, Ponies For Japanese Sought For.

Headquarters of General Count Keller, Niut Klay, eleven miles west of Lian dian sian, July 12.—The opposing armies are grimly facing each other on the heights across the Liank river, ready to engage in a death grapple.

The Liank crosses the main Liao Yang road to Fen Huang Cheng road, twenty-eight miles east of Liao Yang, flows north into the Tai Sze river, which passes through Liao Yang and empties into the Liao river.

The correspondent of the Associated Press, who arrived here after a thirty-five mile ride from Siao Lindji saw long lines of infantry and transport trains winding through the mountains.

At Lian Dian Sian a lookout, stationed in a tree top, pointed out the way to Gen. Keller's headquarters, near Niut Klay. There the Russian eastern army was found, hidden in the hills.

In a plain tent, the correspondent saw Gen. Keller, living like a simple soldier, his staff being quartered in a native hut near by. The general was cheerful and bronzed by exposure. He talked enthusiastically of the engagement at Hoyan.

Around the general's tent were many officers of the Guards, the pride of St. Petersburg. To see them as weather-beaten as the Cossack officers, one could scarcely believe them to be the dashing Guardsmen of the Russian capital. They have become hardened fighters, for hardly a day passes without collisions between the advance posts of the eastern army of the Japanese.

The whole army is anxious to fight Gen. Kuraki, whose headquarters are at Vandianpuzie, and whose men are entrenched on the other side of the river. The burning question is who will be the first to cross the dread walls of the Liank river?

Ponies and Bronchos For Japan. New Orleans, July 12.—Creole ponies from the prairies of south-west Louisiana may be bringing the battles of Japan within two months, it is believed that a Texas firm has been approached by Minister Takahira, of Japan, with a view to securing a hundred thousand head of horses of the type now used by the Japanese cavalry.

EXPOSED IT.

A BIG CUSTOMS FRAUD IS UNCOVERED.

Valuables Smuggled Into New York by Conspiracy of Steamship Employees and Wealthy Merchants.

New York, July 13.—Behind the arrest of the wireless telegraph operator or a hospital steward employed on one of the largest trans-Atlantic liners, charged with smuggling Sumatra tobacco, the customs officials claim to have unearthed a new and ingenious method of smuggling diamonds, silks, tobacco, and other merchandise which should pay a high duty.

Frauds on the government of enormous proportions are believed to have been perpetrated by this method. Its successful conduct required a combination of expressmen, steamship employees, and possibly government officials. Its beneficiaries, and possibly its promoters, are believed to be merchants of this city, some of them men of wealth and prominence.

BRIDE MUST HAVE DOWER. Young Woman Must Have \$20,000 a Year.

London, July 13.—The sole engrossing title in the royal annals, and, of course, in the smart set, is the reported betrothal of Prince Arthur of Connaught, the only son of King Edward's only living brother, and Lady Marjorie Manners, the eldest daughter of the Marquis of Salisbury, heir of the Duke of Rutland.

This is a love affair, it is absolutely true, and for two months their affection has been apparent to their very intimate friends. The prince has been a frequent visitor at Belvoir castle, where Lady Marjorie has spent the most of the last two months.

About a fortnight ago the prince proposed, and the young people being very earnestly in love with each other, the king was approached on the subject by his nephew.

His majesty had no objections to the match, provided the bride could raise a dowry of \$20,000 a year. This is absolutely impossible, as the Granby estate, which is the Duke of Rutland's, therefore at the present moment the young people are in deep woe.

But perhaps the secret of the king's opposition lies in the well-known fact that all his life he has greatly disliked the girl's mother, the Marchioness of Granby.

Prince Arthur is so much in love that his one idea is to renounce all his rights to a quiet life, and become, as he himself puts it, an easy going country gentleman. Lady Marjorie, however, is very pretty, and has been extremely popular in London society.

She said that she asked her daughter to clean up one of the rooms, and the daughter refused to do so, and when upbraided for her disobedience struck her mother.

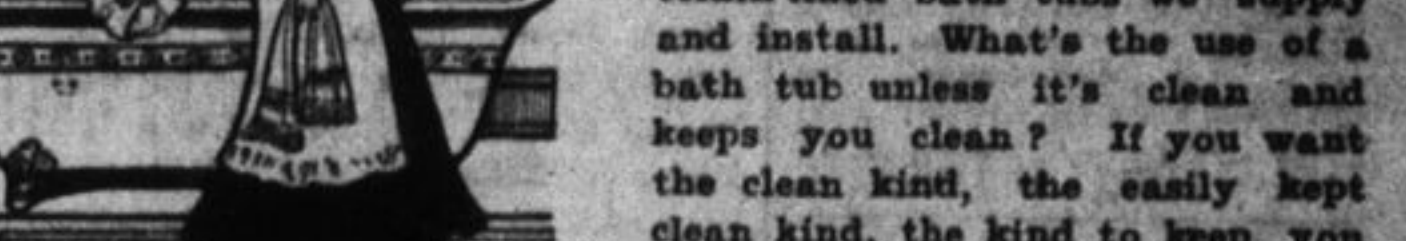
