

YEARS AFTER.

FATHER AND SON, SEPARATED AT JOHNSTOWN, MET.

One Had Lived In Scotland And The Other In South America, But They Came Together In A Theatre.

Atlantic City, N.J., July 14.—After a fifteen years separation, believing each other dead, Richard Paget and his son, Herbert, met in the city last night under dramatic circumstances.

Unable to find his boy, the father could not stand the strain he was undergoing, and after a vain search, he decided to return to his old home in Scotland.

When Herbert Paget was permitted to leave the Altoona Hospital, he went at once to Johnstown, where he tried to get some trace of his father. He was unable to do so. Being left to his own resources, he went to Denver, where he worked for several years.

The last four years he has been employed by a mining concern at Battle Creek, Mich. Last April they sent young Paget to Bolivia, South America, to superintend the installation of engines and look after their mining interests there.

The elder Paget, the father, had gradually died away, resuming business in Edinburgh, was successful, and is now wealthy.

A feeling kept urging him to return again to this country for a visit. The voyage did not agree with him, and he came to Atlantic City. He was accompanied to this country by Mr. and Mrs. John MacDermott of Edinburgh.

Young Paget returned to the United States from South America, met a party of friends last Friday. Unknown to each other, father and son were passing Young's pier, when their attention was attracted by a man announcing a "thrilling and spectacular" reproduction of the Johnstown flood, and both went into the hall, where the performance was given.

The performance was too much for the elder man, who treated considerably excitedly by weeping aloud and begging to be taken from the theatre.

The performance was stopped, the lights turned on, and as the old man was being assisted from the house he passed his son in the aisle.

"Father, oh father, is it you?" cried his son.

"My son, my son!" feebly cried the old man, and then fainted in his boy's arms.

Mr. Paget was taken to a private office, and was soon restored to consciousness.

"We would rather you wouldn't say too much about this meeting," said Herbert Paget. "Father and I want to enjoy our new found happiness by ourselves. I cannot tell you how we feel about it. We only ask to be left alone. Father, Mr. and Mrs. MacDermott and I intend to go straight to St. Louis. What our plans in the future shall be have not as yet materialized. We haven't thought of that. Why should we?"

The Ontario Farmers' Outlook. A tour of observation just now through the western part of Ontario shows this fine country district at its best.

The fall wheat crop is headed out and vigorous in appearance, insuring a fair return, if it escapes rust. Barley is unusually strong, and is, in spite of the dilatory spring, well advanced for the period.

Oats and peas promise equally well at a wider interval from maturity. The grass crop is quite exceptional. The cutting of hay is in full swing, and the growth is almost unprecedentedly heavy.

A few bright days would place its quality where its quantity now is, quite beyond peradventure. With a reasonable prospect for fruit, early and late, the season bids fair to be a fortunate one for the Ontario farmer.

Many Lives Lost In Flood. Manila, July 14.—A cloudburst over the hills northeast of Manila caused a flood which destroyed San Juan del Monte. Two hundred lives were lost.

The low lying districts were inundated. The homes of Americans and foreigners are isolated. Transportation through the streets is carried on in boats only.

Rain has fallen for twenty-seven hours; totaling seventeen and one-fifth inches. This is unprecedented. Communication with outside places is interrupted.

The damage to property is estimated at \$2,000,000.

Prof. Goldwin Smith's Suggestion. London, July 15.—Prof. Goldwin Smith, writing to a Dundee correspondent on the Irish question, says it would be as safe a solution as any to have an annual session of the Irish members at Dublin for the discussion of purely Irish questions, subject to the ratification of the united parliament at Westminster, where the Irish representation would remain the same as at present.

Emigration Swindler Punished. London, July 15.—A Russian Jew has been sentenced at Dublin to twelve months' hard labor for obtaining money from people at Leeds on the ground that he was the manager of a Canada society. He announced passages to Canada at one pound per head, and in addition advertised that work would be provided in any town, with home rent free, "as nobody paid any rent in Canada."

IN THE CHURCHES.

What is Doing In The Denominations. There are 143 denominations in the United States. A great evangelistic campaign is on in Philadelphia. Eight large tents are in use.

The total gift in the United States for the last eleven years to education amounted to \$610,410,000.

Rev. J. Lambert Alexander, late of Lanark, was recently installed as permanent pastor of the Union church, Berlin, Wis.

American missions now have over eighteen churches in Austria planted in centres of influence, with a membership of 1,414.

There are 1,750 English clergymen who are shareholders in joint stock companies engaged in the liquor traffic in London alone.

Out of 72,398 students in seventy-two American colleges, thirty-three per cent. are members of the Young Men's Christian Association.

The American board has eighty-five Bible women and forty-nine native teachers in the Madura field, with a church membership of 5,936.

Rev. Lemuel Moss, D.D., LL.D., one of the foremost Baptist educators and divines, is dead at New York, after an illness of more than a year.

The Uganda mission, in Central Africa, began twenty years ago, has now 1,070 church buildings, seating 126,850 persons, erected chiefly at the cost of people.

The news that the Archbishop of Westminster, England, has become in practice a total abstainer, has been hailed with great enthusiasm among Catholic temperance workers in England.

By the death of Bishop Huntington, Right Rev. Charles T. Olmsted, D.D., who was appointed co-adjutor in 1902, succeeds to the bishopric of the diocese of Central New York, with the full powers, Guthrie, conductor of the China Inland mission reports in China 199 stations and 783 workers.

During the past year thirteen new stations were opened and 1,688 persons baptized. In the once bitterly anti-foreign province of Hunan mission stations have been opened in all but one of the prefectural cities.

The Salvation Army now has thirty-eight stations and outposts in Japan, with ninety officers and cadets, all but thirteen of whom are Japanese, a home for discharged prisoners, a rescue home for women, a sailors' home at Yokohama for foreign seamen, and a league of mercy composed almost entirely of Japanese women.

Australia has 3,950 Christian Endeavor societies, and the enthusiasts there are greatly interested in missions to the aboriginals. Among Japan's 115 Christian Endeavor societies are some in the royal navy, one in a post-office, and others in the famous Okayama Orphan Asylum, conducted by Ishii, the Japanese George Muller.

Korea has twelve societies. Togo, the great admiral of Japan, is said to be an earnest Christian, as is his wife, who is a graduate of Vassar College. Admirals Urin and Leuro are members of the Presbyterian church, and a recent canvass reveals that more than 100 officers of the Christian army are also members of Christian churches. Reports continue to come that the government of Japan is seriously planning to de-throne all of the idols of the land and in some way to commend Christianity to the nation.
