FIFTH OF THE NEWS. The Very Latest News Culled From All Over the World.

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LAI HIS PLANS BEFORE PARLIAMENT. Army Is To Be Divided Into Two Parts.—The Standing Force Is To Be Reduced.—One Of The Costliest Machines Ever Devised, as Presently Constituted.

London, July 16.—War Secretary Arnold-Forster, made his long promised statement as to his proposed reform of the army when the House of Commons went into committee on the vote for the war office. The secretary said he did not propose to touch the militia, as public opinion was not ripe therefor, neither would the artillery be decreased nor the number of cavalry regiments be reduced. He proposed to reduce the regular infantry forces by fourteen battalions, leaving forty or fifty battalions for home service, after providing for India and the colonies.

HOUSE SOON THROUGH. No New Legislation Will Be Introduced.

Ottawa, June 16.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier made the important statement when the house met that there would be no new railway subsidies granted this session. The Canadian minister said that all the legislation proposed in the order paper except a bill dealing with the Canada Eastern, which it is understood, the government intends purchasing from the owner, Mr. Gibson. This railway subsidy legislation affecting existing subsidies to railways, but no new aid of any kind would be granted, and the supplementary estimates would be down on Tuesday next. The announcement indicates an early adjournment.

WAR SECRETARY. LAID HIS PLANS BEFORE PARLIAMENT.

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SHOT BY HIS OWN GUN. Loaned Neighbor Weapon To Keep Off Marauders.

Selkirk, Ont., July 10.—William Edsall, aged thirty, was shot by Dr. John Fry, treasurer of Hainshaw township, and his injuries may terminate fatally. Two daughters of Dr. Fry, one from Detroit, and the other from Toronto, are visiting at home, and about two o'clock on Monday and Wednesday morning a bad quarrel arose, and the window of their room and some one endeavored to force an entrance. The screams of the girls, however, frightened the intruder away. The doctor borrowed a shotgun from his neighbor, William Edsall in preparation for the next visit, which occurred yesterday.

BOY BARKED LIKE DOG. Appalling Case—Grandfather Died Of Hydrophobia.

Owosso, Mich., July 16.—Johnny Laclair, fifteen years of age, is thought to be doomed. He has developed the fatal trait that cost the lives of his father and his grandfather. He has had violent fits which lasted several hours, and name never terminating in his death. During the attack the boy barked like a dog. The boy's grandfather was once bitten by a mad dog, finally dying from the effects of the injuries. His father developed similar fits, and when seized by them would bark like a dog. He, too, died in such an attack, and the boy probably inherits the tendency from his two ancestors.

FASTED 30 DAYS. New Jersey Missionary Only Lost 25 Pounds.

New York, July 16.—Edward R. Taylor, a city missionary of Plainfield, N.J., has just ended a thirty days' fast and appears none the worse for his ordeal. When he started to abstain from solid food, he tipped the scales at 220 pounds, and to-day he weighs but twenty-five pounds less. During the time of his abstinence from solid nourishment Taylor took walks for exercise, and part of the time attended to his duties as missionary. He declares that his general health is much better.

A SEA BATTLE. Engagement Of Port Arthur Reported From Shanghai.

Special to the Whig. London, July 16.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post, calling under date of July 15th, says: "A naval engagement took place today off Port Arthur. Reconnaissance in force carried out by the Russian cavalry and artillery yesterday and to-day, almost as far south as Kailchou, failed to disclose the Japanese." Story Reported From Tashichiao.

MOVING FORWARD. St. Petersburg, July 16.—(4 p.m.)—The imperial headquarters staff officially deny the reports, from St. Petersburg, that the Japanese lost 30,000 men in a battle near Port Arthur on July 10th or 11th. Not a shot was fired on either side.

TRIAL FOR MANSLAUGHTER. James Dunn Responsible For Uncle's Death.

Special to the Whig. Campbellford, Ont., July 16.—The inquiry conducted here by Coroner C. McFarlane, into the death of Fraser Dunn, of this town, who died on Wednesday night last, as the result of injuries received at the hands of his nephew, James Dunn, was concluded last night. The jury, after considering the evidence came to the conclusion that Fraser Dunn came to his death from injuries by ill-treatment on the part of James Dunn. The latter will now be tried for manslaughter.

AN ANGRY SERVANT. Stabs His Mistress—She Will Recover.

Toronto, July 16.—Maddened because he was turned away for drinking, James Kennedy, a servant man, formerly employed by Mrs. King, 300 Broad Street, sprang at Mrs. King this morning, with a stiletto and before he could be stopped, had stabbed her twice. The wounds inflicted are in the shoulder and Mrs. King will recover. Kennedy was caught shortly afterwards.

CAROLINA IS OFF. Strathcona, With Two Pumps, Did The Trick.

Quebec, July 16.—The wrecking steamer Lord Strathcona, wrecked at St. Alphonse this morning, early, and at high water with two pumps succeeded in getting the Carolina off the rocks and landed her on a sand bank. The Strathcona expects to leave with the Carolina for Quebec tomorrow.

CROP PROSPECTS SPLENDID. Plenty Of Rain In Manitoba In Spring.

Fowler, secretary of the North-West Grain Dealers' Association, who has just returned from a trip through the west, reports the crop prospects splendid, especially in Manitoba. There was much rain early in the season in some districts south of Winnipeg. Edward Lloyd Hamilton, unable to swim, had a narrow escape from going over an American Falls, clinging to a rock below Great Island. He had been walking on Willow Island and slipped in. Lightning smashed a brick cistern in Cornwall, tossing two boys carrying lamps, back, neither was hurt, and the lamp was not put out.
