The Russians Can Act During Fogs.

ATTACK BEGUN.

STOESSEL SANGUINE THAT HE CAN HOLD OUT.

Yinkow Is Open To Neutral Ships - Infantry Look Like School Boys - War Ships Said to Have Left Port Arthur - Chinese Can Tell Nothing.

Special to the Whig. London, July 29.-A despatch to the Daily Mail, from Yokohama, states that a general attack on Port Arthur began on Tuesday. A Tokio despatch, dated yesterday, says there is no news from Port Arthur save that there are continual fogs, except in the middle of the day, under cover of which Russian gunboats steal out of the harbor and harass the Japanese ships that are besieging the fortress. The Japanese destroyers, the despatch adds, drive the gunboats back. The Chronicle's correspondent at Yinkow says that the Japanese infantry, who have taken possession of the Russian barracks, are very small, they look like a school battalion, but they themselves admirably. They are thoroughly military in appearance. The shops are reopening and the aspect of the town is normal. It is announced that the port at Yinkow is now open to neutral ships. The Chronicle's correspondent at Yinkow says that the Japanese infantry, who have taken possession of the Russian barracks, are very small, they look like a school battalion, but they themselves admirably. They are thoroughly military in appearance. The shops are reopening and the aspect of the town is normal. It is announced that the port at Yinkow is now open to neutral ships.

Can Hold Out.

Chefoo, July 29.-A Russian officer, who has arrived here, commissioned by Gen. Stoessel, the commander at Port Arthur, to buy cartridges for the defenders, declares that the defenders are sanguine of holding the fortress. Chinese refugees from Port Arthur say that three large warships have left that port. The Chinese cannot give the names or the type of the vessels. It is impossible to confirm this story from the foreigners.

What They Held.

Tokio, July 29.-The position held by the Russians, last Sunday, south of Tashichiao, on a stretch of nine miles of trenches and fortifications.

Ordered To Harbin.

St. Petersburg, July 29.-A despatch received from Gen. Kouropatkin, today, announced that the position at the front had changed. It is generally believed here that the developments are imminent. All the correspondents have been ordered to Harbin.

Story Not Confirmed.

London, July 29.-The report that Gen. Kouropatkin is ordered to return to have originated at Tsin, but it is not confirmed. A despatch to the Daily Telegraph from Tokio says that the police at Shimonoseki, Province of Idzu, reported at midday, that heavy cannonading had been heard at sea since ten o'clock the night before.

Japanese Moves.

Tokio, July 29.-The Russians abandoned Tashichiao, at noon on Monday, July 25th, retiring before the advancing army. They applied the torch to Tashichiao and the surrounding towns and when the Japanese arrived they found the flames were still raging. The Japanese pursuit ended beyond Tashichiao, and the Japanese left wing occupied Yinkow. The position held by the Russians last Sunday, south of Tashichiao, consisted of nine miles of trenches and fortifications.

Under Jap Control.

New Chang, July 29.-Takayama, the Japanese administrator of New Chang, has arrived here and has issued notification to the population that New Chang and Yinkow are now under Japanese control and that lives and property will be protected.

Honor King Humbert's Memory.

Rome, July 29.-Today was the fourth anniversary of the tragic death of King Humbert, who was assassinated at Monza, July 29th, 1900, by Gaetano Bresci, an anarchist. In accordance with custom, the anniversary was observed by commemorative exercises throughout the kingdom. In the capital there was a pilgrimage of many thousands of visitors to the tomb of the dead king in the Pantheon. King Victor Emmanuel, accompanied by Queen Helena and members of the royal family, visited the tomb and spent an hour in prayer. The tomb was within a hidden vault in a mass of magnificent floral offerings. The anniversary has renewed interest and speculation in the fate of the assassin, Bresci, concerning which numerous contradictory stories are told. It has been reported at intervals that Bresci is dead, but this is not generally credited. The probabilities are that he is still confined in prison and that he is totally mad as has been reported.

To Visit Game Preserves.

The party consists of eleven members, and the trip will be one for fishing and rest. Several days will be spent on the preserves.

NEW REIGN OF TERROR.

The Nihilists Are Again At Work.

St. Petersburg, July 29.-The assassination of M. Von Plehve has created a panic in high official circles. The tragedy completely overshadows the disastrous events of the war. It is not merely the individual crime which appeals, but the knowledge of what it forbodes. The police possess clues which leads to the conclusion that M. Von Plehve's murder was the result of a carefully prepared plot and that a new Nihilist reign of terror has been inaugurated. Von Plehve was appointed minister of interior, April 15th, 1902, succeeding M. Sipiagin, who was assassinated April 16th, 1902, by a student named Balmashov. He had formerly been director of the police. Plehve conducted the prosecution of the assassins of Alexander II. in 1881, and from that time his power increased until it became once second in importance to that of the emperor. Several plots to assassinate him have, according to reports, been discovered during the past few years. The educated youths of Russia are said to have been bitterly opposed to M. Plehve's appointment, he was claimed, to his turning on his own people and to the drastic changes which he inaugurated or advocated. He is said to have regarded the common people as either dangerous criminals to be repressed, or as innocents to be ignored. Von Plehve was largely of Polish blood. He was regarded in many ways the power behind the throne. He was drafted on account of his control of the (third-secret) section of the police, and owing to the fact that he controlled the press of Russia through the censors, who, it has been understood, did M. Plehve's bidding without question. What part, if any, M. Von Plehve actually played in the Kishineff massacres will probably never be known; but his enemies have claimed that he had knowledge of the events leading thereto, through his political friend and agent, Kroushvan, known as the most extreme anti-Semite in Russia, and proprietor of the Besarabetsa, a newspaper of Kishineff. Has Reached Port.

Tokio, July 29.-The Pacific mail company's steamer Korea, which, it was rumored, had been captured by the Russian Vladivostok squadron, has arrived at its destination safely. The Korea sailed from San Francisco for Yokohama and Hong Kong on July 12th, with a general cargo.

Stones Thrown At Muraviev.

St. Petersburg, July 29.-As Minister of Justice Muraviev was driving to the Peterhof palace yesterday afternoon to report to Emperor Nicholas the assassination of Minister von Plehve, he was pelted with stones by a mob of workmen. The identity of the assailants has not yet been discovered.

CAUSED BY FRICTION.

A Disastrous Fire In Eby, Blain & Co's Block. Special to the Whig. Toronto, July 29.-A serious fire started the night of Monday, 10:30 o'clock, in the four-story building, corner Front and Scott streets, owned and occupied by Eby, Blain & Co., wholesale grocers. It was started by one of the junior clerks, about the tackle of the elevator on the top floor, and it supposed to have been caused by friction. The fire brigade was allowed in responding, and was hampered by the wires on the street when it did enter. In the meantime the fire spread rapidly through the roof. Fortunately, the firemen were able to attack from three sides, and also ascended to the roof of H. P. Eckardt & Co., wholesale grocers, on the opposite side of Scott street, and poured streams on the flames. By hard work the firemen had the flames under control within an hour. The damage by a fire was confined to the top floor and roof, but tons of water poured down through the other floors into the basement. The total loss, therefore, is hard to estimate, but probably will reach \$50,000. There was insurance of \$125,000 on the stock and \$40,000 on the building.

IS RECOGNIZED.

RUSSIA'S DESIRE TO ADHERE TO RULES.

And Not Violate Any International Law-The Ship's Crew Are Held On Board a Russian Cruiser-The Steamer Korea Has Safely Reached Port.

London, July 29.-Foreign Secretary Lansdowne has received assurances from the Russian government that full satisfaction will be given Great Britain in the matter of the sinking of the steamer Knight Commander. His young son, Douglas, three years old, was lying sleeping in the grass near the house, when the father with the mowing machine went into the paddock to mow. Not until he saw the child under the cutting bar of the machine did he know that he was out of the house. The unfortunate child had a large piece of flesh cut from the thigh, one of his arms almost severed, and a nasty gash cut in the side of his head.

LIBERALS CAPTURE A SEAT.

Win At Oawestry Fight On Tariff Issue. London, July 29.-The liberals gained a seat at Oawestry (West Shropshire), in the bye-election yesterday, presided by the question of the refusal of Hon. George Ormsby-Gore (conservative) to the Harlech barony. The result was as follows: A. H. Bright, lib. .... 4,542 W. C. Bridgeman, con. .... 3,157 Liberal majority ..... 1,385 At the last election Mr. Ormsby-Gore defeated Mr. Bright by 1,083 votes.

BIG MINERS' STRIKE.

Seventy-Five Thousand Men May Be Called Out. Scranton, Pa., July 29.-There is grave fear that the executive board of district No. 1, United Mine Workers, will order a strike, involving approximately 75,000 men, when it meets here next Monday to consider the question of the refusal of the coal companies to deduct checkweighmen's wages. If the strike is ordered probably it will affect the whole anthracite region, as the companies seem to be combined in resisting the demand, claiming it is tantamount to a recognition of the union.

Good Find Of Alabama Ore.

Birmingham, Ala., July 29.-A discovery of a large deposit of grey or magnetic ore near Spencerville, Ala., has caused considerable interest in industrial circles here, inasmuch as it develops the fact that there is ore in abundance in other places besides on the mountains in the immediate Birmingham district, or on Lookout Mountain. The ore runs 45 to 47 per cent. metallic iron with other elements about the same as the red ore in the Birmingham district, except that the ore has fluxing element equivalent to 6 per cent. of carbonaceous lime. There are probably 10,000,000 tons, if not more, in a six-foot seam which has been tapped.

Presbytery Gave Consent.

Montreal, July 29.-At a meeting of the Montreal presbytery, this morning, the call from a Longue Point, Ont., Presbyterian congregation to Rev. Prof. Ross of the Montreal Presbyterian College, was considered and the presbytery having accepted, the professor gave its consent to the change.

ELECTIONS THIS FALL.

Both Sides Expect Appeal To Country. Ottawa, July 29.-The common house on both sides of the house is that the government will appeal to the country this fall or winter. So certain have the opposition felt on this subject that Mr. Borden's friends are already planning his forthcoming tour, whilst Tory campaign literature is being rushed through the mails under the franking privilege at the rate of thirty thousand pamphlets a day. On the other hand, the liberals have not sent out any literature. This is taken as strong evidence that another session will be held before dissolution.

A WARM FIGHT.

Active Campaign For Damages.

Special to the Whig. New York, July 29.-It is evident from plans now being made that the democrats intend to carry on the most active campaign this fall that has been seen since 1884, when Senator Arthur P. Gorman, as chairman of the national committee, made the fight that resulted in making Grover Cleveland president. Entire floors have been secured in several buildings in the vicinity of Madison Square, to be used as work-rooms for the clerical force of the campaign body. In addition to these rooms several parlors have been engaged in the Hoffman house, which will be used exclusively by the chairman of the committee and his assistants for reception purposes and for the discussion of general campaign business. It is intended to secure separate quarters from which to send out the literature and in which to receive and tabulate the results of canvasses in various sections of the country. Upward of 15,000,000 documents were sent out in the Cleveland 1884 campaign, and these same methods will be duplicated this year. In order to do this effectively along the old lines, it has been arranged that John R. Trainor, who had charge of this work under Senator Gorman in 1884, shall be in charge of the same work for the national committee this year.
