CHURCH WORK.

A NEW GAIN OF 2,000 IN SOCIETIES.

Calls And Invitations Extended to Various Clergymen--An Aged Bishop to Celebrate an Anniversary.

Protestant Christian communicants in China number 112,808. St. Paul's church, Truro, N.S., has given a call in favor of Rev. Dr. McLeod-Attwood, Ont.

Bishop Wilkins, of St. Andrew's, has been elected Primate of the Scottish Episcopal church. The demand for ministers in the Wesleyan Methodist body in England is far beyond the supply available.

Rev. E. G. Robb, of Annapolis, has accepted the call to become pastor of the Presbyterian church at Bristol, Que.

A memorial tablet in honor of Robert Louis Stevenson was unveiled recently in St. Giles' cathedral by Lord Rosbery.

Rev. Jacob Prither, the well-known Scots anti-Romanist propagandist, has admitted his charge at Turahill, Dumfries.

A memorial window to the late Dean Farrar has been unveiled by the Rev. Canon Ripon in St. John's church, Boston, Eng.

Manchester College, the principal Baptist seminary in England, has just constituted in connection with it a faculty of theology.

The United C. E. society of America reports a net gain during the year of 2,000 societies. Eight states now have salaried organizing secretaries.

After five years' evangelistic effort in the United States and Great Britain, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Varley have returned for Melbourne, Australia.

It is not likely that the denomination has accepted of any such special committee, to arrange for church union, will be called before late in October or early in November.

Rev. W. C. Borden, B.A., has been appointed secretary and treasurer of the Methodist church in Japan, in place of the Rev. Dr. McDonald, who has held that office for some years.

Rev. G. W. Henderson, of the Cambridge street Methodist church, Lindsay, has been invited as pastor for the Methodist church, Port Hope. Transfer to take place at the next conference. He has accepted.

Prof. Marcus Dods, of Edinburgh, in inducting two new professors into the New College, Edinburgh, declared that a church was bound to maintain its right to be evangelical in its teaching.

Prof. George Adam Smith is at home once more in Glasgow, restored to health and strength. The doctors, however, have advised him to take things easily for a little time longer, though they have allowed him to resume his work as long as he does not attempt too much.

Speaking of "The Army's Mother," the late Mrs. Booth, General Booth said, "She had a notion that I was worth caring for, and that no one will be so capable of disparaging that duty as herself. She believed in me. When she went her way to heaven, what a loss was mine! She was a living proof that a Salvation wife can be a tower of strength to a Salvation husband."

The religious statistics of Great Britain show that the Nonconformists have half the church-goers in England and more than half the Sunday-school scholars. The last year bringing them an increase of twenty-eight thousand communicants and sixty-three thousand scholars. The Anglican church possesses 7,127,334 church members, with about five million attendants, counting communicants and Sunday-school scholars together. The Free churches have eight million attendants, with about five and a half million attendants.

Mrs. Ursula Gestefeld, a New Englander, who has formulated a new system of interpreting the Bible, is now in England seeking to advance her views. According to Mrs. Gestefeld, the Old Testament must be regarded as allegorical. It is the fall of Adam and Eve that is taken as symbolic of the acquisition of knowledge. Mrs. Gestefeld regards the Bible as a history of the evolution of human consciousness. She is not acquainted with either Hebrew or Greek; but she considers that the interpretation of the Bible does not depend upon scholarship, but upon insight.

Dr. Richard Poyer Lewis, the aged Bishop of Llandaff, Wales, this year completes the twenty-first year of his accession to the throne of St. Dubricius, and a movement has been initiated by Lord Tredegar and other influential laymen in the diocese to commemorate his episcopal majority. Dr. Lewis is one of the most interesting personalities on the episcopal bench, for he must be almost the last survivor of the youthful "Tractarians," who used to hang on the lips of Newman, at St. Mary's, Oxford. He derives his Christian name from his ancestor, Col. Poyer, the Royalist leader, who made a stubborn defence of Pembroke Castle against Cromwell.

Gold In Lorraine

Berlin, July 25--While prospecting for iron in the Elies valley in Lorraine, a party of mining engineers accidentally discovered auriferous beds. Samples were submitted to an expert at Strassburg, and analytical chemists from London and Saarbrücken, who report that they contain from 5.7 to 10 grams of gold per ton. The precious metal is chiefly deposited in sand, and it has been found possible by means of the cyanide process, to extract almost the whole of the gold. A company to exploit the discovery is in course of formation.

MACBETH POPULAR WITH THE ACTRESSES.

Several Will Produce It Next Season--Viola Allen's Company--The English Stars Who Will Come To America.

Maude Adams is to have a new comedy which Israel Zangwill will write, in three months' time. The play will be one of rural England, in four acts.

J. M. Barrie, the novelist, is said to be writing a play for Ellen Terry, who is reported to have been engaged by Charles Frohman to star in this country.

Cecilia Loftus has arrived from France. She will open at the Lyceum Theatre, New York, September 3rd, in "The Serio-Comic Government," by Israel Zangwill.

James K. Hackett will star Arthur Byron in a new farcical comedy in September, at the Princess Theatre, entitled "Jack's Little Surprise," by Louis Egan.

The Shuberts are negotiating with Edward Terry with a view to bringing him and his London company to the Princess Theatre, New York, next season to produce "The House of Burial."

Sir Henry Irving, Sir Charles Wyndham, Mrs. Patricia Campbell, Ellen Terry, John Hare, Irene Vanbrugh, Marie Tempest, and H. B. Irving will be seen in America next season under Mr. Frohman's management.

Sir Henry Irving, the English comedian, has been engaged by Viola Allen's production of "A Winter's Tale" for next season. Mr. Bracey will appear as Clowin in "A Winter's Tale," and Feste, the jester, in "Twelfth Night."

For Lulu Glaser's support in her new opera, "A Madcap Princess," Willbach, Prudettes, Bartram Wallis, Donald McLaren, Arthur Barry, Frank Reicher, Reginald Harlow, Mary Conwell, and Gwendolyn Valentine have been engaged.

There is at present a French invasion of London going on: There are no less than three theatres given over to French actors and French plays. Bernhardt and Rejane divide the honors between them. The divine Sarah is playing in "La Sorciere," Sardou's latest drama and one which has not elicited unstinted praise from the critics.

In all probability "Macbeth" will become something of a reigning dramatic sensation the coming season, if present plans of several stars are carried out. Mrs. Leslie Carter has hinted at portraying the role of Lady Macbeth for several seasons, and it is confidently assumed that she will finally play the part this coming season. The defence is that the part was not suited to Dodson, and that he received the usual two weeks' notice.

Most of the company to support Viola Allen in "The Winter's Tale" for next season has been selected. Of Miss Allen's company of last season Zeffie Tilbury, Frank Currier, James Young, and C. Leslie Allen have been re-engaged. Miss Tilbury will impersonate Pauline, Mr. Currier, Antiochus; Mr. Young, Florisel; and C. Leslie Allen, the Shepherd. Miss Allen will double Hermione and Perdita. On the few occasions that "Twelfth Night" will be given, Miss Allen and the members of her company retained will assume the same roles as heretofore. Of the new members of Miss Allen's company Henry Jewett will be the leading man, appearing as Leontes in "The Winter's Tale" and Malvolio in "Twelfth Night." Boyd Putnam will be Plixenes of "The Winter's Tale" and the Duke Orsino of "Twelfth Night."
