FOR THE LUMBER CAMPS IN ALGOMA.

The Steel Plant Will Begin Service About August 15th-Why The Coke Is Manufactured At American Soo.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., July 29 .-The Algoma Commercial is advertising for 1,000 men for the lumber camps getting out pulpwood and wood for the charcoal ovens, the saw mill and the vencer plant, which will operated at once. Negotiations have been going on for the purchase of pig iron and other supplies, and the steel plant will commence operations about August 15th. It is announced that coke built in the American Soo to supply coke for the blast furnaces. The reasons for building on the American side is on account of duty on coal, the gas, a by-product, will be used for lighting and heating purposes.

ALMOST GONE.

A Lad's Life Was Saved Swift's Wharf.

Swift's wharf was very nearly the scene of a sad drowning accident on Friday morning. Thomas Healey, the little seven-year-old son of Thomas Healey, Princess street, was fishing at the end of the wharf alone about 11:30 o'clock when, in some unknown manner, he lost his balance and fell into the water. The child was unable to swim and, it is supposed, sank imhe thought he heard a splash and sus peeting what had happened, he imme diately informed Peter Clark, the foreman on the wharf, of the circumstance. The latter secured the grap pling irons which are kept in the en gine room and hastened to the spot where the boy was last seen. By this time the boy had been under water, it is estimated, about three minutes and the only trace of him seen by his reseuers was some bubbles of air which were rising to the surface. Mr. Clark cast the grappling irons into the water at the spot where the bubbles were rising. So true was his aim that at the very first cast, he was successful in securing the boy's coat collar with one of the hooks and the apparently drowned child was instantly hauled ip on the wharf.
