Hotels And Cottages Full-Alexandria Bay Has Lost Its Former Standing-A Connecting Link Between The Old And The New. Thousand Island Park, Aug. 9.-

Thousand Island Park is the busiest place among the river summer re wellesley hotels are filled to their ut-most, and there is scarcely a cottage most, and there is scarcely a cottage that has not a good quota of summer residents and transients. Not in five years has the celebrated old park been so largely populated. At the Columbian there is the former gaiety among the guests which was lacking for some time. Various reasons are advanced for its failure to draw tourists, one of which is that the Frontenac hotel on Round Island has been a very serious competitor. The Thousand Island Park has increased in popularity in spite of the prohibition of liquor and its strict observance of the Sabbath, for no excursion or traffic steamer can land there on Sunday. All the drinks that can be procured at the Columbian are mineral water, ginger, ale, lemoned. petitor.
