> "WEE KIRKERS" WIN. Contest Over Ownership Of Free

Church Property. London, Aug. 9 .- An amazing situation has been created in Scotland by a decision of the House of Lords by which over one hundred churches and colleges for the training of ministers and teachers in Edinburgh, Glasgow and Aberdeen and property variously estimated at from £4,000,000 to £10; .000,000 (\$12,000,000 to \$50,000. 000) pass into the hands of ministers of the Free church living mostly in the far northern counties of Invernessshire, Ross and Cromarty.
