A SAIL YACHT RECOVERED, BUT OCCUPANTS ARE MISSING.

Two Young Detroiters Were Sailing Her—Is Thought Capsized in High Sea—A Tug Searching For Trace of Sailors.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 10.—Circumstances surrounding the recovery of the sail yacht Rambler, in Lake Erie, below Amherstburg, yesterday, have created grave fears for the safety of two young Detroiters, who were known to be aboard her—Percy R. Bowen and Harrison E. Welton, both aged about sixteen years.

While it is possible that the craft floated away from some temporary camping ground of the boys, the general supposition is that the craft was capsized by the high seas which were running at the time, and that its occupants were drowned.
