JUDGE PARKER'S STATEMENT AT NOTIFICATION

Democratic Party in Favor of a Reasonable Reduction of Tariff—Gold Standard Upheld—Stood In The Rain.

Esopus, N.Y., Aug. 11.—Alton B. Parker, yesterday received formal notification of his nomination for the presidency of the United States as the candidate of the democratic party, and in accepting the nomination gave public expressions for the first time of his views on the issues drawn between his own and the republican party.

Standing bareheaded, during a brief lull in the rainstorm, Judge Parker

accepted the nomination and set forth his views upon the issues before the country in a speech that evoked frequent applause.

"I must, in justice to myself and to relieve my sense of gratitude, express my profound appreciation of the confidence reposed in me by the convention. After nominating me and subsequently receiving a communication declaring that I regarded the gold standard as firmly and irrevocably established, a matter concerning which I felt it incumbent upon me to make known my attitude, so that hereafter no man could justly say that his support had been secured through indication or mistake, the convention reiterated its determination that should be the standard bearer of the party in the present contest.

"The present tariff law is unjust in its operation, excessive in many of its rates, and so framed in particular instances as to exact inordinate profits from the people. It is a fact, and should be frankly conceded, that should our party be successful in the coming contest, we cannot hope to secure a majority in the senate during the next four years, and hence we shall be unable to secure any modification in the tariff save that to which the republican majority in the senate may consent. While, therefore, we are unable to give assurances of relief to the people from such excessive duties as burden them, it is due to them that we state our position to be in favor of a reasonable reduction of the tariff; that we believe it is demanded by the best interests of both manufacturer and consumer, and that a wise and beneficent revision of the tariff can be accomplished as soon as both branches of congress and an executive in favor of it are elected without creating that sense of uncertainty and instability that has on other occasions manifested itself.

"The speech was heard with close attention and applause was frequent. His audience awaited only a high pitch of enthusiasm when he spoke of the policies of so-called militarism and imperialism.

"Durs is a world power," said he, "and as such it must be maintained, but I do not believe that it is at all recently that the United States attained that eminence."

This brought forth a burst of cheers that caused the speaker to wait a few minutes before he continued to speak. His pledge not to accept a second term if he was elected aroused instant interest, which increased to marked enthusiasm when the speaker went on to explain his position.
