OBJECTS OF THE GRANTS.

AWFUL DEEDS

JEW MASSACRED BY RUSSIANS.

Two Quarrels Over Trifling Matters Lead to Fearful Riot and Bloodshed.

New York, Aug. 16.—The Morning Journal prints the following from its Warsaw (Russia) correspondent: "On Sunday (Government of Rodom), a Jew was quarrelling with a Gentile. The latter, who was an epileptic, fell during the encounter as a result of one of his epileptic fits. The Christian bystanders, however, raised the cry that the Jew had murdered their comrade."

"Another massacre occurred Saturday, July 30th, in town of Potzweh (Government of Sedlitz), in the following manner. "A local clergyman induced a small Hebrew girl to embrace the Christian faith. The parents of the girl went to the church where their daughter was confined, accompanied by some of their Jewish friends, and demanded her return on the ground that the girl was under age and could not act independently in such matters, and that consequently her parents had the right to interfere with her action. The clergyman, seeing force if necessary, called the mayor or to his aid. The two incited the populace against the Jews and a fierce riot ensued. More than 100 Jews were severely wounded. The number of dead is unknown, because the police withhold the facts."

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest News Culled From All Over The World.

The czar's son has been gazetted chief of the Cossacks. The steel plant in Sault Ste. Marie will open on September 1st. The R.C.Y.C. island club house, at Toronto, was destroyed by fire.

The czarina and the infant czarevich continue to progress favorably. At St. Petersburg Gen. Gladzoff has been appointed minister of public instruction.

Messrs. Fielding, Paterson, Sifton and Brodeur will probably form the new tariff commission. The Anglo-French convention bill read a third time in the House of Lords and passed.

The Bank of Montreal is to erect a building, of its own design, on the site of the Queen's Hotel. W. D. Harrington, Halifax, collector of customs, died on Monday. He was at one time M.P.P., representing Halifax county.

Jack Madigan was killed and John Hamilton was probably fatally injured by W. L. Elliott, a saloon keeper, of Goldfield, Nev.

R. L. Borden, in St. John, N. B., stated that he looks for the general elections the last of October or the first of November.

It is reported at Winnipeg that the C.P.R. employees in several branches of the service are considering a demand for increased pay. The British cruiser Minerva has arrived at Tangier, Morocco, to enforce the demand for the release of a British subject wrongfully imprisoned.

The Dominion government is as yet without official information as to the extent of reported seizures of Canadian sealing schooners by United States cruisers in Behring sea.

Col. Lord Aylmer, general-in-chief of Canada, will probably be the next inspector-general of the Canadian militia under the plan which the minister explained to parliament last session.

It is reported in New York that Miss Eva Booth, head of the Salvation Army in Canada, will be called on to succeed Commander Booth-Tucker when he leaves the United States in November.

A farmer named August Fortin, of Cape St. Ignace, county of Montmagny, Que., was found lying dead in the woods with his throat cut. While in a fit of temporary insanity he committed suicide.

Marcellus A. Smith, one of the most widely known civil engineers in the Dominion, died Sunday, at Ottawa, in his ninetieth year. He took a prominent part in the location of the Great Western railway.

The establishment of a line of steamers on the Pacific from Canadian ports to ports of Japan and China, is to be inaugurated by the Allan company, before the completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway.

The steamer Penguin, engaged in a search for Kruger's millions, is alleged to have been sunk with the steamer Zululand off the coast of Natal, three years ago, has been wrecked with the loss of twenty-five lives.

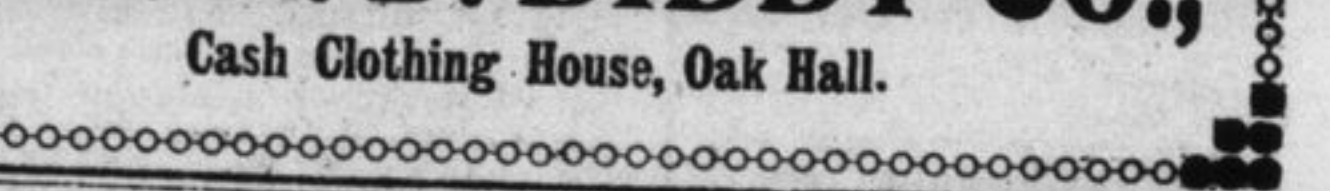
