JEWS MASSACRED BY RUS-SIANS.

Iwo Quarrels Over Trifling Matters Lead to Fearful Riot and Bloodshed. New York, Aug. 16,-The Morning

Journal prints the following from its Warsaw (Russia) correspondent : "On Sunday, July 31st, in the city of Ostrowitz (Government of Rodom), a Jew was quarrelling with a Gentile during the encounter as a result of bystanders, however, raised the cry that the Jew had murdered their comrade. In a short time all the Christian inhabitants of the town turned out and proceeded to avenge the aleged crime. The riot that ensued resolved itself into an awful massacre of Jews, of whom twenty were killed and a great number were wounded. The

massacre lasted all day. "Another massacre occurred Saturday, July 30th, in town of Potzeveh (Government of Sedlitz), in the fol-

"A local clergyman induced a small Hebrew girl to embrace the Christian faith. The parents of the girl went the church where their daughter was confined, accompanied by some of their Jewish friends, and demanded her release on the ground that the court decided that the girl was under age and could not act independently in such matters, and that consequently her parents had the right to interfere with her action.
