GEN. KUROKI Unsuccessful in Crossing River on pontoons. IT WAS FORDED HIGHER UP—THE JAPANESE PIERCE RUSSIAN LINES.



Kouropatkin Abandoned Liao Yang—Japs Possess It—25,000 Casualties On Both Sides—Intense Disappointment In St. Petersburg. Special to the Whig. Liao Yang, Sept. 2.—Gen. Kuroki made his first attempt to cross the Taitee river late on Wednesday evening, under cover of a heavy bombardment on the extreme Russian left, by means of pontoons.

Japanese In Liao Yang. Tokio, Sept. 2.—At daybreak, yesterday, the Japanese army on the left delivered a fierce assault against the heights to the west of Heilongting and the high ground to the west of Shoushan Pass. The attack pierced the Russian lines, and, later, forced the retirement of the Russian troops from their position on the right and centre.

Bombardment Over. Paris, Sept. 2.—A despatch to the Matin, from Chelso, says that the bombardment of Port Arthur has been completely suspended. It would appear that the Japanese have abandoned the idea of taking the fortress by assault, and will endeavor to reduce it by establishing a strict blockade.

SEIZED GUNS. And Then Used Them—Confusion In Retreat. Special to the Whig. Tokio, Sept. 2. (3 p.m.)—The chief of staff of the Centre Japanese army (Gen. Nodzu), telegraphing early this morning, reported that the Japanese centre was continuing to advance with the object of taking a line from Shichiyen to Liao Yang and effecting a rejunction with the Japanese left (commanded by Gen. Ghu).
