EXCURSIONISTS FOR NORTHWEST HARVEST FIELDS SHOW ROWDYISM

Stole Two Bales of Cloth—A Picton Man Stabbed In Scrap—Police Accompany Train West.

Ottawa, Sept. 2.—A gang of 1,000 excursionists from Nova Scotia, bound for the North-West harvest fields, made rough-house on a C.P.R. train coming from Montreal this morning. At Calumet some entered a store, and stole two bales of cloth. An Italian named Flaminio, of Sidney, C.B., and Hugh McDonald, Picton, got into a scrap, and the latter was stabbed in the back. The Ottawa police were notified and a squad met the train. The Italian was arrested, and McDonald held as a witness. The stolen stuff was recovered. Police accompanied the train west.

COURT MARTIAL.

The Case Still Going On At The Armouries.

At the continuation of the court-martial proceedings against Pay Sgt. Hilton, this morning, the first witnesses to be heard were Drivers Ferrier, Manion and Lamereaux. Their evidence was of much the same character as that given by the other witnesses for the prosecution.

On August 9th Gunner Manion came to him in the battery office and asked for his pay. He (witness) was doing work for Maj. Bursall and told him he had not his pay, but he had the money out in the city and would get it for him. The money was in a residence he (witness) had taken in Williamsville, as he was about to be discharged. He (witness) went away with the remark that it was all right. Sgt. Maj. Gimblett came to him and told him to get Manion's pay as he was kicking up a row about it. He (witness) told Gimblett to tell Manion to wait a minute and come out and see him. Witness brought Manion into the office and showed his account on the pay sheet and he had a balance of \$2.00. Manion seemed satisfied and he (witness) told him to come in in the morning. Manion came the next morning and asked for his pay. He (witness) did not go to his house in Williamsville in the meantime and Manion said he would see about it. Witness told Manion to come back in the afternoon and at noon got the money and was in the office until six o'clock when Manion did not come after his money. Next morning he saw Manion on parade and asked him why he did not come and get his pay. Manion replied that he was not going to be bothered running after him all the time. Witness told Manion he would give him his pay if he came after it. Witness denied the statement made by Manion, that he (witness) had asked him, if he could do with a few dollars' pay that month as he (witness) had signed for the pay and was short of money. He (witness) had money until he had needed more he could have got it in many places.

In regard to the evidence of Sgt. Ferrier, he (witness) was sure that when the former came to him on August 4th, he was satisfied with his account. Witness arranged to give him his pay later on. On the same morning that Manion came to him he (witness) went to Ferrier and told him to come that afternoon and he would then give him his pay. Ferrier told him to keep it until the end of the month as he considered it as good as in the bank. The money was brought to him (witness) from the Williamsville house on August 10th, and he was placed under arrest at noon on August 11th.

Witness kept the battery bank deposit book and during the month of August it was out of his possession August 19th, and not again until August 28th, when he handed it to Major Bursall, who signed everything without looking at or checking the items. In regard to the \$107.74 which Major Bursall said he gave to witness to deposit, the latter said that after they had finished paying the amount of \$107.74, he had a balance of \$16.74 left, but had 50c. too much. The reason of this was that the cheque drawn out for the last pay was \$6c. too much. Major Bursall gave him the \$16.74 and told him to pay those men and he (witness) entered the sum up in the bank book. He (witness) from the Major Bursall signed it. Major Bursall did not give him the money to deposit in the bank, but told him to pay the men with it.

SKETCH OF THE CAREER
Of British Statesman, Who Succeeded Lord Minto.
Albert Henry George Grey, who was born November 28th, 1813, is the son of Gen. Hon. Charles Grey. His mother was a daughter of Sir Thomas Harvie Farquhar. The Countess of Antrim is his sister. He inherited his title in 1894.
The now-governor-general was an intimate friend of the late Cecil Rhodes and is one of the executors of his will. He was a special favorite with the late Queen Victoria, his father, Gen. Grey, being for many years private secretary to her majesty and chief of the suite which accompanied the Prince of Wales when he made his famous visit to Canada. Earl Grey is a grandson of the late Prince Consort, and Queen Victoria herself stood sponsor to his eldest daughter.
The Countess of Grey is the daughter of Robert Stayer Holford, M.P. for Westbury, Gloucestershire. They were married in 1877.
The family of Grey is one of the oldest in Northumberland, and the present earl traces his lineage back to Sir John Grey, a knight of Berkeley in the fourteenth century. The first earl was a distinguished commanding officer in the first American war. The estate of the earl covers about 17,000 acres. His seat is Howick House, Leazes, Northumberland. The earl's eldest son bears the title Viscount Howick.
The third Earl Grey was a cousin of Lord Durham, who was sent out in 1839 to Canada to report on the estate of the colony after the rebellion. Lady Minto is a sister of the present earl.
Mrs. Grey and her daughter, Miss M. Thornton, who have been visiting friends and relatives for the past couple of weeks in Syracuse, N.Y., and other American cities, have returned home.

USE OF DRUGS.

MORPHINE HABIT ON INCREASE IN LONDON.

Doctors Blamed For Spread—Druggists May Make Union Effort To Check The Practice—Large Demand For Cocaine.
London, Sept. 2.—The English women drink in the thing that people over here have become hardened to, but Londoners are greatly worried over the discovery that an increasing number of women are becoming addicted to the habit of using drugs. London druggists admit that the sale of laudanum, cocaine, arsenic and morphine, has almost been doubled during the last five years.

"That the drug habit is increasing at a terrible rate among women," says a prominent druggist, "is evident to all of us, and also that the habit has its fashions. The popular drug is continually changing. About twenty years ago laudanum was in favor, and I sold gallons of it. Then came arsenic, which is still being sold in great quantities to women, but morphine and cocaine are mostly in demand now."

Miss Constance Smedley, founder of the Women's Club, while admitting that she is aware of the increase of the drug habit, says that it is confined to a certain set, consisting mostly of actresses and society women. "It is an explanation," she said, "in the case of actresses is that they need a stimulant to be able to play the same part night after night, and with society persons the habit is started because they have nothing to do. Bored and irritated they are tempted to try a drug, and it easily becomes a craving."

The president of the British pharmaceutical conference, which met the other day in Sheffield, said that the fault was all with the physicians, who were always willing to prescribe these dangerous drugs whenever their patients wanted them, and suggested that the druggists adopt the rule never to sell any of these poisonous drugs to persons more than once on the same prescription and to stamp every prescription "void" as soon as filled.
