WAS DROWNED

While Duck Hunting In The West. West Prince Albert, N.W.T., Sept. 2.—Frank Burmas was drowned in the Saskatchewan river, about four miles east of the town, yesterday morning, while duck hunting. He was thirty-one years of age and leaves a widow and infant child.

ON INSPECTING TOUR

Signal Inspector Bruce Carruthers, of Kingston, director of signalling for the western military districts, will be in Windsor in a few days to inspect the signal corps of the 21st Fusiliers. Carruthers won a reputation for himself in South Africa, when, with his little band of sixteen troopers of the 3rd Canadian Mounted Rifles, he was surrounded by 1,000 Boers. Carruthers was wounded, and every man of his little detachment was either killed or wounded. The survivors were all captured.

HEAVY THUNDER STORM

Struck Toronto This Morning—Subway Flooded. Toronto, Sept. 2.—A heavy thunder storm visited the city about eight o'clock this morning, but little actual damage by lightning is reported. The street railway was flooded, and the car traffic was interrupted to that extent. The lightning struck the flag pole staff on the Imperial bank office, at Bloor and Yonge street.

DRAGGED TO DEATH

Broncho Took Fright—Tied about Body. Toronto, Sept. 2.—A Galician boy, fourteen years old, was dragged to death at a farm three and one-half miles north of Gilbert Plains, by a broncho he was leading to water. The boy attached the halter to his body and the horse taking fright ran away.

THEFT FROM A BANK

Waterbury, Mass., Sept. 2.—Nathan A. Frye, treasurer of the Waterbury Savings bank, was arrested, charged with embezzling \$12,000 from the institution. He is said to have confessed. The bank is declared to be protected by a bond of \$20,000.

ARCHBISHOP WATCHED CHEMICAL EXPERIMENTS AT M'GILL.

Photographed With Archbishop. Montreal, Sept. 2.—The first thing the Archbishop of Canterbury did this morning after leaving the home of the Archbishop of Montreal, where he is a guest, was to sit for a photograph with the venerable Dr. Bond. The party then proceeded to visit McGill University, where the archbishop witnessed some experiments with liquid acids and radium. From there he went to St. Andrew's Rome, and afterwards to the Y.M.C.A. At noon there was a largely attended luncheon at the Windsor in his honor, tendered by the Anglican clergy, church-waifs and laity. This afternoon his grace is attending a garden party, the hostess being Mrs. James Ross, whose hospitality is widely known. Afterwards the second formal dinner of his grace's visit will be given at "Bishopcourt." He leaves at 10:30 o'clock to-night, by the G.T.R. for Toronto.

PROMINENT CHARACTER

Is Marquis Ito, Of The Japanese Island. Marquis Hirobumi Ito is one of the world's prominent characters and the foremost of Japan's statesmen and warriors. He was born in the province of Chosu in 1840, and came into the political arena just when his country needed a progressive man.

JOHN J. LONG'S ESTATE

Will Filed At Barrie—About a Million. Toronto, Sept. 2.—As was stated at the time of his death, the estate of the late John J. Long, Collingwood, will amount to about \$1,000,000. The will will be filed at Barrie. It is said that bequests are made to the General Marine hospital, Collingwood, and St. Mary's church, Collingwood, and the residue of the estate is distributed as follows: One-half to a brother, Thomas Long, and family, Toronto; one-quarter to another brother, Michael Long, and family, Collingwood; and one-quarter to a sister, Mrs. John Byrnes, and family, Collingwood. The executors are: Thomas Long and J. N. Hopkins, bookkeeper for the firm for a great many years.

KNOW NOTHING OF IT

Office Said To Be For Mr. Cowan. Windsor, Ont., Sept. 2.—It is rumored here that M. K. Cowan, M.P. for South Essex, has accepted the editorship of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway at a salary of \$7,000 a year, and that Dr. James Samson, Windsor, will be the liberal candidate in South Essex. Dr. Samson, when interviewed, claimed to know nothing whatever of any such arrangement and Mr. Cowan is out of the city.

PLEAD NOT GUILTY

To Charge Of Assault In La-crosse Game. Toronto, Sept. 2.—Hugh Lambie and Charles Query, Tecumseh lacrosse players, were remanded, in to-day's police court, for a week. They pleaded not guilty to the charge of assaulting Robert Chitty, Montreal, in Saturday's game. Chitty, K.C., who appeared for the team, argued that the men should be allowed to be tried by a jury, but the magistrate held that he himself had full authority to try such charges.

CLOSE SEASON REGULATIONS

Committee Recommended Extra Fire Protection. Toronto, Sept. 2.—The killing of a seal has been prohibited, in Ontario, until November, 1905, and the killing of deer in the Bruce Peninsula for three years. The committee which visited various cities of the United States, to inspect the fire protection, have presented a report to the mayor. They recommend a system of extra mains in the congested districts, five more engines, fifty more firemen, and a fire tug on the bay.

Burned Or Injured

Yellow Creek, O., Sept. 2.—Six persons were burned to death and four terribly injured by fire and oil explosion here, early to-day. One Hour At Alexandria Bay. Steamer America, Saturday, 3:30 p.m., remains one hour so as to be able to see the magnificent fireworks, only 35 cents.

Will Arbitrate Over Check Weighing System. Wilmington, Del., Sept. 2.—Judge George Gray has announced that he would consent to the request of the conciliation board of the United Mine Workers Association that he arbitrate the dispute over the check weighing system.

THE RAILROAD SMASH

Names Of Dead And Wounded—Hurt Cared For. Winnipeg, Sept. 2.—The second section of the Imperial Limited, having the vice-regal party on board, ran into an open switch at Sinital, shortly after midnight, a freight train, which crashed into the siding, killing five people, and injuring the same number. The five passengers killed were all women and together with the injured were all on the same tourist car.

Attack On Capital Of Paraguay Imminent

Buenos Ayres, Sept. 2.—The Paraguayan revolutionists have captured Villa Concepcion, and 400 men with arms and ammunition. The revolutionists now refuse all the terms offered them by the government and an attack on the capital is believed to be imminent. Argentina has refused to recognize the insurgents as belligerents. Papers received from Asuncion report that all the public schools are closed and that owing to the scarcity of food the price of bread and biscuits is \$1 per kilogramme.

Men Fall From Eighty-Foot Standpipe

Special to the Whig. Leithridge, N.W.T., Sept. 2.—While three men engaged in the waterworks construction, George Moore, London, Ont.; Walter Roach, Chicago, and E. Lombard, Los Angeles, Cal., were painting near the top of an eighty-foot standpipe, yesterday, the rope carrying the stage scaffold on which they were standing, gave way, and they fell to the ground. Lombard suffered internal injuries, which resulted in his death a half hour later. Moore had his two legs broken, and his leg dislocated; and Roach had his left leg and arm broken, and suffered internal injuries; he may die.

WORLD TIDINGS

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Despatches and Cullings Telling of Events Transpiring in All Parts of The Earth. Algona Central trains are running as far as Trout Lake. Dr. Wallace, M.P. for Russell, is anxious to retire from public life. Goldwin Smith's "My Memory of Gladstone" will be published on Monday. Harvesting was general throughout the west on Thursday, with very favorable weather. Dr. E. G. Simons, a wealthy physician, of Ripley, N.Y., was killed by a freight train in Glenville, Ohio. The late Samuel Moss left \$200 to the English, German and Polish synagogues of Montreal, his native city. It is reported that Prince Skiatopolavsky will succeed the late M. Von Plehve as minister of the interior. The Chinese Eastern railway will be opened to Japanese military traffic between Tuchengetze and Tashichang shortly. Judge Edgar M. Cullen, Brooklyn, has been appointed chief judge of the court of appeals by Gov. Odell to succeed Judge Alton B. Parker, resigned. Brandon police are still dragging the river for Albert Walker, but have not yet found his body. The theory is advanced that he has left the city. Grading on the South-Western Traction company's line between London and St. Thomas has been completed, and now only six miles of rails remain to be laid. The Ontario Jockey Club has added an extra race for the closing day of its autumn meeting, September 24th. It is called the "Special Hack or Hunter's race," for the tyrie cup. At Tokio, on September 1st, the Crown Prince Yoshihito Barunomiya celebrated his twenty-sixth birthday at his villa in Shoubara. He received congratulations from the prince, the elder statesmen, cabinet officers and generals at the front.
