NEVER YIELD. Czar Will Not Brook Intervention.

KUROKI'S PERIL SAID TO BE IN DANGER FROM LINEVITCH. A Statement That The Czar Wanted The World To Know-He Will Fight Until Everything Is Gone-The Tactics Of The Japanese.

Special to the Whig. London, Sept. 13.-A report is current from a source that cannot be traced, that Russian official despatches have reached London announcing that Gen. Zassalich, who commanded part of the Russian rear guard, south of the Hun river, has been severely wounded and captured with 5,000 of his 8,000 troops.

AFTER RAILWAY COMPANY. Company To Be Indicted For Carelessness. Special to the Whig. Toronto, Sept. 13.-At yesterday's meeting of the city council, a motion was sent to the board of control, to the effect that as several accidents have resulted by reason of the criminal neglect of the Toronto Railway company to equip their cars with power brakes, and to keep their tracks and roadbed in proper repair, the city solicitor is instructed to forthwith, consult with crown authorities, and prefer such indictment against the president, directors and other officers of the company as circumstances may warrant.

MOUNTED POLICE. Colonel Aymer Slated For The Position of Inspector-General And Widal His Successor-General Capital Notes. Ottawa, Sept. 13.-Letters from Sergeant P. J. Fitzgerald, who commands the police detachment at Fort McPherson at the junction of the Mackenzie and Peel Rivers, not far from the Arctic Sea, have been received. The detachment is in good health, and has had no mishaps, save that constable Walkers but his foot with an axe, and was laid up for thirty-four days. The Peel River was frozen solid for seven months and eleven days, but started to break up on May 23rd. As late as June 14th, when there was a heavy storm, snow fell, up to July 1st, when the report was closed, very little fish was caught. No deer or moose had been shot, nor had any meat come into the fort that spring. Several muskoxen skins were shot not far from the fort. Fur-bearing animals were reported plentiful. The lowest point reached by the thermometer was 60 below, and that was on February 18th.

Mrs. Needham, in reply, made an eloquent address, showing fine discrimination, commendable scholarship and an earnest interest in the welfare of the pupils. Rev. J. W. Milne and Dr. Hurdidge, and Levi Cranell, also made speeches. Rev. Dr. Hurdidge speaking of the great value of education, and the fact that the church is waking up to its responsibilities in the matter. The college has opened the term with a largely increased attendance.

The following militia order which appears to have a bearing on recent complaints and agitators was issued to-day: "In future no recommendation for the removal of an officer from the militia will be accepted unless it is shown that he has been notified of the proposed action and has been called upon to show the cause why the removal should not take place. The notification must be either delivered to the officer in person, or else mailed to his last known address. The officer's written reply must accompany the recommendation for his removal. If he fails to reply, a copy of the notification and a statement showing the time of its delivery or mailing must be attached to the recommendation."
