IS TO COME OFF

RACE 30 FOOTERS FOR CANADIAN CUP.

Terms Arranged At Rochester And First Race Will Be Sailed On August 19th, Next.

Messrs. George H. Goodrham and Stephen Bam, of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, Toronto, have agreed with the Rochester Yacht Club upon the terms and conditions to govern the race for the Canada's cup, for which the boats is to be only thirty feet, and the first race is to be sailed on Saturday, August 12th, 1905. The races will be sailed off Charlotte harbor, and must be completed in five and one-half hours after the start. The course will be a twenty-seven mile triangle, and four miles to windward and return, twice sailed over.



Burglars are operating at Galt, Ont.

The 15,000 convicts in England cost \$3,000,000 every year.

Capt. W. White, R.N., who was naval adviser to Canada in 1895, died at London.

An apple is growing from the trunk of a tree in an orchard at East farm, near Maidstone.

S. J. Perry, the king's prizeman, was given a military reception at Winnipeg on Monday.

The first shipment of 10,000 tons of rails from the Soo for the Intercolonial railway has arrived.

James Sanguin, sectionman, fell off a gravel train at Blackwater, and was run over and killed.

Municipal guards and firemen forcibly expelled the Barnabee monks from the monastery at Paris.

The biennial election in the state of Maine was won by the republicans with a majority of about 33,000.

Only two men killed and not hundreds, as at first reported, in the wreck near Reno, Nev., of a Knights Templar train.

M. Couquelin, the famous Parisian actor, was operated on for an abscess in one of his jaws. The patient refused to take an anæsthetic.

William S. Robinson was hanged at Kentville, N.S., on Monday morning, for the murder of his wife. He died protesting his innocence.

The Allan, Dominion and Canadian Pacific steamship lines have reduced their steamer rates from London or Liverpool to Quebec from \$15 to \$10.

The Earl of Dartmouth has arrived at New York. He came for the purpose of laying the corner stone of the new Dartmouth hall at Dartmouth college, New Hampshire.

The Ottoman bank at Constantinople, has notified the American legation that it holds \$25,000 at its disposal in settlement of the claim for land illegally seized and belonging to an American citizen at Smyrna.
