COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets. An edition has been commenced in New York for a more rigid form of its description. Montreal made Toronto by five to one in its branch houses in the west to catch the trade. Winnipeg a fall of Montreal. The gold price opened in August, as reported by the Johannesburg Chamber of Mines, was \$12.77 ounces, against \$12.75 in July. It is estimated that \$275,000 is the difference per annum of raising the twenty-five ton ship compared with the twenty-ton ship.

The Ontario department of agriculture will make an effort to demonstrate that it is practicable to grow a larger crop of Northern Ontario to the North-West, and this need not be a huge market for the Ontario fruit grower.

The United States government report is considered to indicate a deficit of nearly 10,000,000 bushels in the total wheat, the condition of spring wheat, the smallest wheat crop since 1897, with an anticipated loss of 100,000 bushels.

Reports of the United States apple crop for August show the yield will be about thirty per cent. larger than last year and fourteen per cent. above the average for the last ten years. Some sources estimate the export for the current year at 70,000,000 barrels. New York state is among the largest apple producers in the west.

Microscopic Letter. Albany, N.Y., Sept. 14.—The smallest piece of mail ever handled by the local authorities came through in the form of a letter which was an inch and one-eighth in width and two and one-eighth inches long. It came out of Boreas and the postmaster there, suspecting that it might be lost in handling, inclosed it in another cover. A stamp of the new issue would have covered the letter entirely.

A GREAT DUEL. THE AWFUL FIGHT AT LIAO YANG DESCRIBED.

Hardest Fighting and Most Desperate Charges of Modern Times—Thousands Killed With Bayonets and Glubbed With Guns.

Headquarters in the Field of Second Japanese Army Before Liao Yang, Manchuria, via Tientsin, Sept. 13.—The capture of Liao Yang, which was accomplished only after nine days of desperate fighting on the part of the second, or left Japanese army, under Gen. Ota. During this time, while the artillery was carried out its part of the greatest artillery duel the world has ever seen, there occurred the hardest fighting and the most desperate industry charges of modern times.

At dawn, August 30th, the Japanese began an artillery attack upon this position. The second army using 216 guns. The Russian Japanese army was forced upon the extreme right, occupying a position on a small chain of hills running at right angles to the Russian position. The fourth army employed nearly 100 guns more than against the enemy at Shoushanpo.

The Russian position in an area of three hills, averaging 300 feet high all fortified with strong entrenchments connecting each one with a covered way leading back to a homestead capable of holding all the guns. The Japanese failed to locate this homestead during the three days' fighting. This artillery duel probably is the greatest in history.

At dawn, August 31st, the firing was resumed, and at 8 a.m. the Japanese unsuccessfully attempted to take a fortified hill on the Russian left. The artillery duel continued through the morning. At 11 a.m. the Japanese fire was concentrated on the trench at the end of a hill on the extreme Russian left. At noon the Japanese infantry took the trench in spite of large casualties. The Russians turned the fire of a score of guns on the Japanese in an unsuccessful attempt to dislodge them.

Both sides kept up an artillery fire all through the night of August 31st, and early the next morning the Japanese attacked the Russian centre. This was a hill defended by three lines of entrenchments. The bottom of the hill was defended by wire entanglements, pits and ditches. Japanese engineers cut the entrenchments after terrific slaughter, one detachment losing seventy-seven out of eighty men.

The first of the Japanese, the flower of the second army, took the first trench with a rush. In the second trench there was a hand-to-hand fight, and the Japanese went on to the top of the hill, trending on their own dead. The trench at the summit was taken, the Russians being driven out at the point of the bayonet and with clubbed guns.

Thousands were killed in this charge and the trenches were filled with the mangled bodies of the Japanese and Russians. In many cases attackers and defenders were found dead and decaying in each other's arms. No more desperate charge was ever made. The position apparently was unassailable and it could have been held by one man against twenty. The taking of this hill ended the defence of this line of positions, the Russian line of entrenchments being almost intact. At daylight of September 1st, the Japanese flag floated over the hills and the Russians had retired toward Liao Yang.

In the meantime the Japanese left had tried flanking movements around the hills. The Russian forces, stretched along the railway embankment, put up a strong defence, but the Japanese steadily. At the Japanese left advanced the night of September 2nd, it discovered a strong Russian position on the plain. The left was repulsed with great losses in its charges on the enemy. A general charge was ordered at dawn and the left succeeded in dislodging the enemy. The right and centre forced the Russians back to Liao Yang, where a desperate stand was made.

On September 3rd, the Russians began to burn the city, while from behind the smoke a constant fire was maintained. The Japanese concentrated their fire effectively on the walls of the old Chinese city, which had been damaged by the Russians.

During the night of September 3rd, the Russians withdrew from Liao Yang, and early the next morning the Japanese occupied the town. The Japanese losses in the second and fourth armies may exceed 10,000 and the Russian losses will not be less. The entire Russian force engaged at Liao Yang probably exceeded 200,000 men.

GEOLOGICAL KNOWLEDGE.

Greatly Assisted by International Committee. Special to the Whig. Ottawa, Sept. 14.—Dr. Robert Bell, acting director of the geological survey, has just returned from acting on an international committee to decide upon a uniform system of classification and nomenclature of the crystalline. Associated with him to represent Canada was Prof. Adams, Montreal. The committee explored the best indications in Michigan, Minnesota, Rainy River, Thunder Bay district, Algona, and came to a complete agreement. This will greatly facilitate the advancement of geological knowledge, which has previously been greatly hampered by serious disagreements.

What Marks, The Lawyer, Says. New York, Sept. 14.—Clara Ward, the ex-princess of China, is coming back to America, according to the announcement made by Adolph Marks, a Chicago lawyer, who arrived here yesterday on the steamer Pennsylvania. Mr. Marks says he has a contract signed by her for a vaudeville engagement.

The lawyer said one of her main objects in coming here was to fight through the courts the persons who had her pronounced insane in Michigan, and who tied up the fortune left by her father, the Michigan lumber merchant.

HAD A HIGH OLD TIME. Evidence At Enquiry Into Scandal At Ottawa.

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—The Isolation Hospital scandal investigation, which was continued to-day before Judge O'Hear, whose evidence of a sensational character was elicited. The principal witnesses were Mrs. Lachance, formerly cook at the hospital, and George Macdonald, old, engineer of the hospital during three months of its operation. Mrs. Lachance testified to seeing Kerrigan, the present engineer, carrying away sacks of stool from the hospital; decided that there was no system of checking supplies, and swore that a good part of the same, and particularly butter and eggs, were had.

Kerrigan denied under oath Mrs. Lachance's accusation against him. George Macdonald, sworn, said that he had come to let no one in after tea, he said, that the girls used to crawl in through the windows. One morning I found a man and a girl sitting on the coal bin. I found fourteen empty liquor bottles one day. The cook used to come in the worse of liquor.

Continuing, Macdonald said the conduct of some of the girls was scandalous. They used to play leap-frog in the halls in their night clothes. "Were any of the help dismissed?" "Not one." Macdonald went on to declare that a lot of provisions were wasted. Miss Ritchie said it was the case in all such institutions. "Did you ever report the cook for being intoxicated?" "Yes, and to did Mr. Booth." "Who was Mr. Booth?" "He was the scrub woman." (Laughter.)

THE CHICAGO OF CANADA. Tells How Winnipeg City is Growing.

Syracuse, N.Y., Sept. 14.—"Winnipeg is the Chicago of Canada, and will soon be one of the most important cities in the Dominion," said E. H. Heyland, at the Yacht Club night in speaking about the Canadian West. Mr. Heyland spoke frequently through the western part of Canada. "The people of the east," said he, "have no idea of the importance and rapid development of the western part of Canada. Winnipeg is across the line from North Dakota. Ten years ago the population was 40,000; today, it is 100,000. The building permits this year up to date have been \$8,000,000. This city is the financial, industrial and distributing centre of a section 1,300 by 1,400 miles.

"Trade conditions were never better than they are in Canada, at present. There has never been a greater exodus of Mormons from Utah, and Alberta hills left to be a second Utah. Jesse Knight, a millionaire Mormon, has created an immense sugar test factory, and is inducing hundreds of Mormons to go from the United States and raise beets for his plant."

WANT NEW RULES. No Challenge Except Under New Measurements.

Glasgow, Sept. 14.—Thomas Lipton and the yacht designers of Glasgow complain of the lack of frankness displayed by the New York Yacht Club, regarding further races for the America's cup. The Englishmen have urged that the next cup race be run under new measurement rules, but they say the Americans need only that a challenge should first be sent, and then the points will be considered. These new measurements proposed stipulate that the yachts should not be mere shells. Unless these barriers are removed there will be no race.

SIR L. BRUNTON. PROMINENT LONDON PHYSICIAN IN TORONTO.

John Morrison Denies Statements in Ottawa Journal—Never Employed by Howards—Writ On Behalf Of Paris Bank.

Special to the Whig. Toronto, Sept. 14.—Sir Lander Brunton, one of the most prominent physicians of London, England, with Lady Brunton, is in the city on his way to the international congress of science at St. Louis.

John Morrison denies the statements made in a special article in the Ottawa Journal, yesterday, signed by F. W. Glen to the effect that he (Morrison) was sent to New York, as a representative of the late Sir Oliver Howards to get funds for conducting the liberal party's campaign for re-appointing with the United States. Mr. Morrison says he was never so employed, never went to New York as Sir Oliver's agent, as every one knows, was opposed to more intimate relations between Canada and the United States.

The council of the board of trade in arranging for an afternoon meeting on Tuesday or Wednesday next to be addressed by Col. Sir C. E. Howard Vincent. Sir Howard addressed the board thirteen years ago, and recalls the event with such pleasure that he has asked for another opportunity. He will address the Empire Club on Tuesday evening.

A writ, issued this morning, at Osgoode Hall, on behalf of the Banque Brocard of Paris, France, on behalf of the bank and other shareholders of the Gold Run Klondike Mining company of London, Eng., for a declaration that the Canadian Gold Mining Company, of Ottawa, and Comstock company, of Ottawa, and Madame Belina, Carpentier, of Dawson, hold the Crozier concession, granted in 1900 as trustees for the plaintiffs.

Borden, leader of the opposition, who is still in the city, has arranged for two more meetings on his Ontario tour. On September 20th, after-noon, he will speak at Blenheim and on September 26th, evening, at Oshawa.

Only a preliminary discussion took place at this morning's conference of the Bible Society representatives who have convened here for the purpose of arranging a union of all the societies in Canada. Rev. Mr. Ritson, secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society is assisting in the discussion.

Three addresses were laid before the meeting one each by Mr. Ritson, Dr. Shaw, Montreal, and Prof. MacLar, Knox College. All were along the same line with head office in Toronto, a board of fourteen, seven of whom shall be at Toronto, and with local autonomy for the different auxiliaries.

ACCEPTED DENIAL. Gamey Said He Did Not Use Words.

This denial Mr. McEvoy has accepted, and, therefore, was no ground for action.

TO ENDOW A CHAIR. To Perpetuate Memory Of Rev. D. J. Macdonnell.

Special to the Whig. Toronto, Ont., Sept. 14.—The Presbyterian ministers of Toronto, to-day, had a meeting to endow a chair at Queen's University to be called after D. J. Macdonnell, who was pastor of St. Andrew's here; \$50,000 or \$60,000 will be required and contributions would be received from others than Presbyterians who admired the late minister's work here. An existing chair might be endowed or a new one established.

THE ASSAULTED UMPIRE. Chitty Will Push Case Against Players.

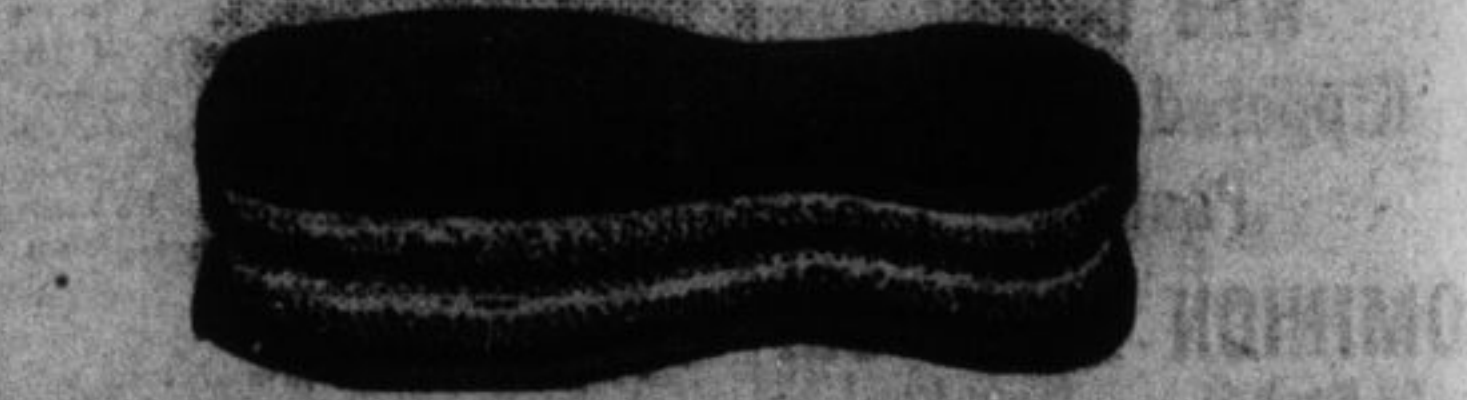
