NEW HOTELS.

Astor is in New York To Look Over Them.

Special to the Whig. William Waldorf Astor's present visit in New York, after an absence of five years abroad, is attracting unusual attention in the real estate market.

Mr. Astor came over primarily to inspect his new Hotel Astor, on Long Acre Square.

He desired also to inspect the new Astor apartment hotel at Broadway and Seventy-fifth street.

He also paid a visit of examination this week to his Graham Court apartments, which cover a block front at Seventh avenue and 116th street.

These three Astor structures were built to discount current real-estate speculation.

They were not undertaken as experiments, for Mr. Astor never tries experiments with his real estate properties. They were the result of established new conditions.

They were not projected until the financial situation had been definitely ascertained with mathematical certainty.

But Mr. Astor has decided personal preferences outside the purely financial aspect of his investments, and his present visit to his native town is to satisfy his personal ideas as to the successful outlook for his grand new hotels.

The magnificent new Hotel Astor has been in operation now two weeks, during which time its splendors have been inspected and admired by thousands of sightseers.

The Astor was the first of Broadway's string of new hotels to be opened for business, the event being simultaneous with the formal opening of the 350-room addition to the Hotel Imperial.

The Hotel Astor, on Long Acre Square and the Madison Square vicinity, are nearly ready for final touches.

The Hotel Astor, covering the old Stuyvesant House site, is scheduled for opening two weeks hence.

The imposing Knickerbocker, another Astor structure, on the old St. Cloud site at Broadway and 42nd street, will not be ready before the holidays.
