

WIFE CRISPI'S YOUTH.

Woman Who Travelled With Italian Statesman In All His Early Wanderings-Strange Actions With Old Age.

Rome, Sept. 16.-Rosalia Montmasson, who was the companion of Crispi in his early wanderings, recentily died in Rome at the age of eighty-one.

she had a remarkable career. Her father was a sexton, and the only education she received was in the duties of a household. When thirtyone years of age, while employed in laundry work in the prison of Palazzo Madama, Turin, she met among the political prisoners the man who was to be several times prime minister of Italy, Francesco Crispi.

A strong affection sprang up between them, and when Crispi was released and went into exile Rosalia followed him, first to Genoa and then to Malta. It was in Malta, while struggling with poverty that Crispi resorved to legalize their union, and a Jesuit priest performed the cere-

Called by his fellow-exiles to London, Crispi was accompanied by his wife, who, gifted with great talent, acted as intermediary between the Italian refugees and Mazzini

In Garibaldi's daring feat, which made Sicily and the whole of the south part of the new Italy, Rosalia was still with Crispi. She was present at all the actions fought, and at the end of the campaign was decorated with a diamond star.

She became strange in her ways, developed a taste for costly, ridiculous dresses, and began to show nordinate love for animals.

Crispi was married again in 1870, and was charged with bigamy, but the courts held that his first marriage was not valid. He allowed Rosalia an annuity, and successive govern ments helped her up to the time her death.



NO LONGER SYMPATHIZED WITH BY PUBLIC.

Both Chicago And Toronto Strikers Lost - Strike-Leaders Blameworthy-List Of New Regulations Proposed Smooth Troubles.

Kingston, Sept. 15 .- (To the Editor): The failure of the butchers strike in Chicago, and the building workers' strike in Toronto, is an dication that the sympathy of the public is no longer with the trade unions to the extent that it formerly was. As a rule, when the people sympathize with the workingmen in a strike the workingman wins, and he deserves to win if he has justice on his side and fights fairly. In the case of the Chicago strike

more than 20,000 men employed in the stock yards there went out over two months ago. These men have now concluded to declare the strike off and return to work at their former wages, after an unprofitable and destructive idleness. Their loss wages will run up into hundreds thousands of dollars, and the loss to their employers will be even greater, not to mention the inconvenience to the general public, and all to no pur-pose. Either the strike leaders saw the result from the first, and deliberately went into a losing fight, or they misjudged the staying powers of the employers. In either case they are blameworthy; they should have had better knowledge of conditions than to allow themselves to lead their followers into a struggle which they could be beaten.

In the case of the Toronto building trades' strike the laborers took advantage of what they thought was a good opportunity in the destruction of buildings caused by the great fire, and for six weeks fought for higher wages, but were defeated, and have asked to return to work at the old wages. Here again there has been great loss of wages to the working-men, and a corresponding loss to the employers and again to no purpose.

Neither strikes nor lockouts are comnendable-they are injurious, finally even to the winners, for they leave hard feelings between employers and employees, and a determination on the part of the losers, to "get even" with the winners at the first favorable opportunity. Of course a strike or a lockout is sometimes an absolute necessity, but in nine cases out of ten. a labor dispute can be settled without resorting to these extreme mea-

In connection with this it has been suggested by one who has given the matter a good deal of thought, that a statute embodying some provisions such as the following should be passed by the legislature :

1. No contracts between employers, employing fifty or more skilled labor-ers, and their laborers shall be binding unless in writing signed by the parties thereto. 2. The contract shall set forth the

hours of labor and the wages to b paid each laborer, which hours and wages shall be deemed reasonable in the then existing expense of living profits derived from the business. 3. The hours of labor and wages shall, from time to time, vary, in proportion as the expense of living and the profits of the business when con-

sidered together, vary. 4. The employer shall agree not to engage in nor use lockonts ngainst the laborers, nor the laborers strike against the employer, under a prescribed penalty. (This provision is not to prohibit the laborer, individu ally, from withdrawing from the em pleyment, nor the employer from di charging him when he is considered by the employer to be incompetent, or inattentive to his work, or insubordinate to the regulations of the business, nor when the business does not

demand his services.) 5. If the parties are unable to agree upon the variation in the hours of labor or wages under the contract, such variations shall be determined by a court of equity, having jurisdiction of the parties on petition by the employer, or by twenty or more of the


