They assumed that the decision of the wreck commissioner, if adverse, would affect or influence the claims against the company, and aggregating some \$180,000. The Mail says that Hon. Mr. Prefontaine practically told the commissioner that he was under political direction. He did nothing of the kind. He conveyed to the commissioner what seemed to be a reasonable request, in behalf of a company which is not a liberal, and whose head is not a liberal, and Capt. Salmon had no occasion to fly off in a tangent, to give a wrong interpretation to the case, and to make a sensation by resigning. The minister, under the circumstances, did the proper thing in taking this touchy official at his word.

It is said that Mr. Borden's call to the leadership of his party had, for one object, "the determination of conservatives to set aside the chief figures in the discredited ministry which disrupted the Borden ministry, and involved the whole party in shame and humiliation on the very eve of an appeal to the country."
