AS DAY LABORER

KAISER'S FRIEND HAD A HARD TIME OF IT.

Imperial Councillor Kolb, of Germany, in Disguise, Labored in Chicago--Writes a Book on Experiences.

Chicago, Oct. 21.--From Berlin comes the story of a high official of the German government who came to this city some time ago and gained experience as a day laborer that he might study American conditions at first hand, and report to Emperor William whose close personal friendship he enjoys.

This official is no less a personage than Imperial Councillor Kolb, one of the most fastidious gentlemen of the imperial ministerial circle. Incidentally his adventures in this city furnished him with ample material for a book. Copies of this book have reached this country.

Here Kolb in his story says: "Arriving in Chicago I completely disguised myself. Next day I received a poverty-stricken immigrant just from Germany. I applied for help and advice to a German society, where I was recommended to a humble inn in a remote part of the city. The proprietor received me and showed me his choice of rooms. There were twelve of them, but only two had windows."

"Both of the rooms with windows were already occupied, so I had to be content with one of the black holes for which I had to pay \$1.25 weekly. Close at hand was a restaurant, at which I ate my meals."

Here Kolb then tells of eating ten-cent meals and his search for employment. He offered himself in these capacities: Hostler, milkman, cooper, grocer, driver, baker's boy, dishwasher, gardener, and blacksmith's helper.

"I was rejected and rebuffed at each place," says Kolb. "Day after day I tramped in search of honest employment till my limbs were weary and feet sore. Finally I secured a casual job, for a few hours, as a so-called 'combust' at a banquet of an athletic association. When the waiters had removed the dirty plates from the tables and placed them on a sideboard, the 'combust' had to load them on a big wooden tray and carry them to the kitchen."

"The work of the evening was harder than may appear at first sight. Before my hands were so blistered that it was painful to grasp the handles of the tray, but it was my first piece of manual labor, and I persisted doggedly. Next day I received my wages of \$1.25. Six weeks more wandering in search of work ensued. Finally I found employment in a brewery, where I had to carry heavy cases, containing bottles of beer, from early morning till late at night."

"In a few days my hands were full of painful cuts from broken glass and splinters from the wooden cases and barrels. I was stiff in every limb and my back ached so that I could hardly stand. Now and then I had lighter work to do, such as washing out dirty barrels, scrubbing the floor of the brewery and sweeping the staircases. After four weeks of this toil I was dismissed for no particular reason except that the foreman wanted a change. I had done my work zealously and efficiently for four weeks, and suddenly I was cast again into the ranks of the unemployed."

"I next found work in a cycle factory, where I had to turn a screw all day long for a weekly wage of 89. The only boarding place available in the vicinity was a lodging house, in which there were twenty beds in one long room. There was no ventilation and no suggestion of cleanliness of any kind."
