Vandal Afterward Says Drink Caused Act.

London, Oct. 20 .- Two extraordinary cases of sacrilege, having features in common, are reported from different parts of the country. The caretaker of Christ church, West

Bromwich, hearing a noise in the organ, found a man named Arthur Coates in the interior of the instrument, surrounded by the wreckage of the mechanism. He assured the official that he had received divine instructions to do the damage. The great organ was practically stripped, and the communications between the keys and other pipes had been broken. The caretaker locked Coates in the

At the police court yesterday Coates said that drink had been his ruin, and he remembered nothing of the occurrence. He added that his father was a master of arts and a teacher at Chel-A lunatic who escaped from Brain-
