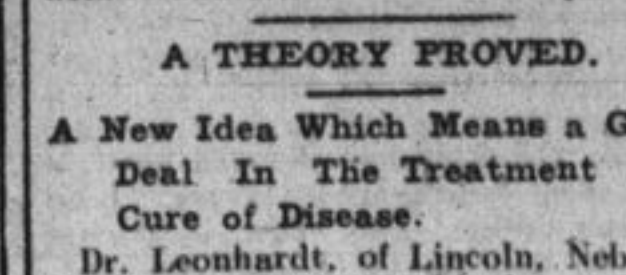

Washington, Nov. 5.—It is practically all over but the shouting. Nobody yet knows who will do the shouting, but the minds of the people are made up, the campaign closes to-night, and the election of Tuesday will only be to secure an official record of a defeat already made.

Six national conventions have nominated candidates for the presidency and for the vice-presidency. Theodore Roosevelt, of New York, was re-nominated for president, and Senator Charles W. Fairbanks, of Indiana, for vice-president, by the Republicans at Chicago. Allen H. Parker, of New York, for president, and Henry G.
