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FOR THREE DAYS
PORT ARTHUR WAS BOMBARDED, CAUSING HAVOC

Being Reinforced, Russians Charged, Desperate Hand To Hand Fights Fought—They Were Beaten Back—Spirit of Men Magnificent.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—A Daily News special from Tokyo, November 6th, via Kobe, November 7th, says: "After three days of continuous bombardment of Port Arthur, which caused extensive destruction to the shipping and Japanese forces in the east centre of the Russian line of defense, and also to Kowloon fort, the right wing of the Japanese army annihilated the Russian force yesterday afternoon. Having carried the approaches, it then sought the assault on the main fortifications under the galling of the forts. In the evening the left wing delivered an assault on Kowloon, fighting its way to the lower parapet. There the Japanese held their ground stubbornly in the face of Russian counterattacks.

Having been reinforced during the night, the Russians charged down upon the Japanese and desperate hand-to-hand conflicts ensued. The Japanese beat back the enemy and destroyed two covered positions in the front row. A Japanese sub-lieutenant with thirty volunteers then succeeded in making his way to the rear of the fort. There he engaged in a personal encounter with a Russian officer and killed him. Having discovered two more defenses in the rear row, the sub-lieutenant withdrew his forces, losing two men.

"Later in the night the advanced position of the Japanese was taken and retaken twice. The besiegers succeeded in holding the approaches and constructing trenches connecting them with the army's front parallel. At dawn numbers of dead were visible on the slopes. Fort P., north of the new and old batteries in the left centre of the line of defense, was captured by the severe fighting of the night.

"These operations have successfully drawn an effective wedge into the Russian front. Severe explosions and extensive fires have occurred in the fortress within the last few days. The total casualties of the Japanese in the late attacks were 1,180. Over 600 were killed up to October 20th. The spirit of the men is magnificent. The firing of all the guns is wonderfully effective.

"The climax to the late bombardment came between four and six o'clock Saturday afternoon. It was a superb spectacle. Every fort of the enemy was engaged and the fighting in the trenches was of a most severe. The outposts of the contending forces were only forty feet apart. At one o'clock this morning one of the Japanese trenches collapsed into a Russian gallery. The Chinese, surprised underground, fled in confusion.

Had To Abandon It.
Chefoo, Nov. 8.—Advices from Port Arthur state that the Japanese, yesterday, made a desperate attempt to capture the Russian entrenchments about Latushan (probably Liao Ti Shan). After a heroic struggle the infantry charged repeatedly, but were moved down by the heavy Russian fire. Finally the Japanese abandoned the attempt after having sustained heavy losses.

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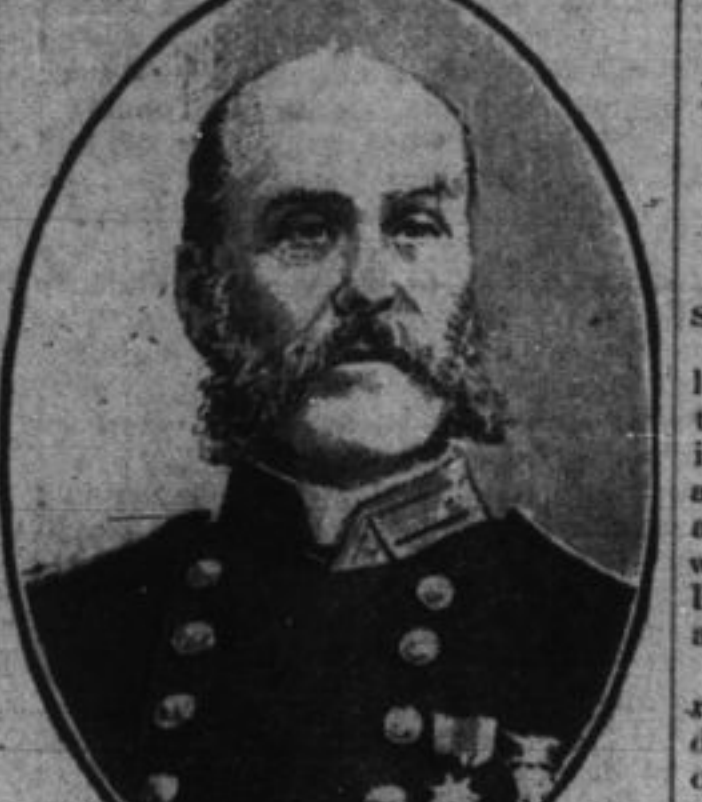
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HE RETIRED.

A RUSJ TO AMERICA.
Leaving At The Rate Of 2,000 A Week.

Washington, Nov. 8.—United States Consul Stephens, at Plymouth, England, says in a recent report: "The British press has called special attention during the last month to the continued flight of the Irish and Cornish to America. Over 25,000 have gone from Ireland alone during the present year, and the exodus, which has received an impetus from the cheap fares, goes on without interruption.

"There is, it is asserted, no greater menace to Ireland's future than this appalling drain by emigration. It is drawing out of the country the best of its peasant class for America, and leaving the unfortunates behind."

"Never before have the Irish people manifested such a determination to leave their country. At present they are leaving at the rate of 2,000 per week, and no argument advanced to keep them in their island has the slightest effect.

"The same conditions, though in a modified form, apply to Cornwall. The mining industry at home is dead. In the British colonies conditions are not at all favorable, hence the weekly exodus to America. Those already in the United States send home money rapidly as possible to assist their relatives and companions in Cornwall to follow."

Kitimaat To Hazelton.
Grand Trunk Pacific Hold Charter Option.

Victoria, B.C., Nov. 8.—It is understood that an option was secured by the G.T.P.R. company, on payment of \$5,000, on the charter of the Pacific, Northern & Ontario railway from Kitimaat to Hazelton. The agreement calls for the closing of the option on or before January 1st, 1905, at a figure of \$20,000.

Ex-Judge Hughes To Marry.
St. Thomas, Nov. 8.—D. J. Hughes, for fifty years county judge of Elgin, who was superannuated last October and who is in the eighty-fifth year of his age, will be married this month to Miss Ada Rowland, daughter of the late Edward Rowland, collector of customs in this city.

FRENCHMEN
IN OTTAWA THINK OF BUILDING STEEL WORKS.

Represent Large Industry In France—Looking Into Mineral Deposits Of Ottawa Section—G.T.P. Will Open Big Demand For Steel Rails.

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—For the purpose of looking into the mineral deposits of this district, with a view of establishing steel works, two French capitalists are in the city. They are Jules Weil and Paul Hock, and are connected with the Compagnie Generale Des Produits Metallurgiques, which operates extensive industries in France. They are making investigations with regard to the prospects for a steel industry which would be established at or near Ottawa or Montreal.

It is believed that the construction of the Grand Trunk railway works at some point in central Canada. Messrs. Hock and Weil were on the hill this morning, getting information along the line indicated. They represent a very extensive industry in France, and one which is stated to have a lot of capital behind it.

PARASITES OF POULTRY.
Cause Of Loss—Prevention And Extirpation.

Parasites are one of the primary causes of unprofitableness and disease in poultry, says the poultry division, Ottawa. The fowls are rarely examined, and the reason of their poor condition is not discovered until it is too late. It will pay every poultryman to examine his birds carefully before they go into winter quarters, as their health and comfort during the next few months largely depend upon the freedom from vermin. There are three distinct groups of parasites preying upon the domestic fowl, lice, mites and mites.

Only one species of flea, the bird flea, lives upon the fowl. It is provided with a sharp piercing mouth, which attacks the fowls at night and through constant irritation and loss of blood does much harm. The mouth of the louse is provided with a sharp point in that it is not sharp and used for piercing, but simply for biting. Lice bite sharply and cause considerable pain. The most injurious of the mites is the red fowl mite. This is yellowish-white to dark red in color, according to the quantity of blood it contains. The blood is drawn from the fowls at night, and during the day the mite hides in the cracks and crevices of the house. The chickens should be examined at night and treatment resorted to. If the poultry house is old and contains many crevices, all nests and roosts should be removed, and the walls and ceiling covered with heavy building paper and lime-wash. The latter should be applied hot and fairly liquid, so as to enter every crevice. Its quality will be improved by adding to every gallon of the wash one quart of kerosene and one quart of soap dissolved in boiling water, also a small quantity of salt. The material taken from the house should be burned, and new roosting quarters and inside fixtures put in. These fittings should be simple and easily removable so that the vermin can be destroyed.

Before the fowls return to the house they should be thoroughly dusted with insect powder or sulphur. By dusting each fowl over a box or paper, the powder can be well rubbed among the quills of the feathers, and the excess will be wasted. The coal tar treatment for the destruction of the worm can be effectively used to rid fowls of vermin. The fowls are placed in a barrel, the inside of which is coated with a mixture of coal tar and kerosene, and the fowls are placed in the barrel, the inside of which is covered. The lice are overcome by the coal tar fumes and fall to the bottom of the barrel. A paper should be placed to catch the vermin when they fall, so that they may be destroyed. The poultry house requires cleaning and limewashing twice a year. The roosts should be removed and treated with coal tar or kerosene every week, and the nests frequently cleaned and new straw placed in them.

It is necessary to regularly examine young chicks for head lice. If not destroyed, they will so weaken the chick that it will die from loss of blood. The lice can be removed by dipping the chick's head with grease or sweet oil to which a few drops of carbolic acid have been added.

Scaly legs, quite prevalent in flocks of neglected poultry, is caused by a species of mite. The scales of the legs and feet become raised and separated, and a chalk-like excretion accumulates between and over them; rough, unimpaired crusts are formed, and under these the mites live and breed. The diseased legs and feet should be well washed with a small stiff brush, warm water and soap. The crusts should then be removed and a mixture of equal parts of sulphur and lard rubbed into the affected parts. After three or four days the legs should be cleansed with soap and warm water.
