ROOSEVELT Will Fill The Presidential Chair. A BIG SWEEP

CARRIED ELECTORAL COLLEGE BY BIG VOTE. Every State Outside "The Solid South" Went Republican—New York State Gave Roosevelt and Higgins a Big Vote—State Legislature is Republican. Special to the Whig. New York, Nov. 9.—Roosevelt has been re-elected president by an overwhelming majority, the returns so far, indicating that the vote in the electoral college will be 325 for Roosevelt and Fairbanks, to 131 for Parker and Davis. The republican party has carried every state in the union outside of the so-called "solid south." In New York state Roosevelt has a plurality of more than 300,000. The returns from congressional districts indicate that the republicans will have a large majority in the congress that they have in the present one. In New York state Mr. Roosevelt has been re-elected governor by what looks to be a large majority. The state legislature also has gone republican by a large majority. Melvin G. Palliser, manager of the campaign for Thomas E. Watson, presidential candidate of the People's party, cries that, as a result of the overwhelming democratic defeat steps would be taken to form a new party. To this end, according to announcement given out, Mr. Bryan, Mr. Watson and William Randolph Hearst, will hold a conference in New York in about a week's time.

"The Parker plurality in the city was 35,000 less than was given Herrick (democrat) for governor." In Brooklyn the republican managers thought Parker might lead Roosevelt, but reports from all but thirty districts give Roosevelt 424 plurality. His total vote fell 15,000 short of Bryan's.

There was a great surprise in the proportions of the vote for Higgins (republican) for governor, he running far ahead of the other candidates of the counties and winning by about 85,000.

His plurality above the Bronx was probably 100,000, while Herrick (republican) for governor, he running far ahead of the other candidates of the counties and winning by about 85,000.

Herick did not carry Albany, his home county, nor did Parker carry Utica, in which he lies. The result of the election was celebrated in New York in the demonstrative manner characteristic of this city. The large crowds in the streets, the parades, the firing of guns, the throngs of people, all indicated that the result was a great triumph for the republican party.

In Wisconsin La Follette, republican, is believed to have been elected governor over Peck, democrat, by a wide plurality. The United States Senator Kittredge claims that Roosevelt has carried South Dakota by 40,000.

In Colorado Adams, democrat, will have 5,000 majority over Peabody for governor. Delaware republicans elect the governor and congressman. The legislature will be overwhelmingly republican. The republicans claim that they will have forty of the fifty members of the legislature on joint ballot. The members of the Adickes faction of the party claim a majority of the legislature for their leader on joint ballot and say they will elect Adickes to the United States senate in January to succeed Senator Ball, whose term expires next March.

In Illinois, Roosevelt has carried Cook county, in which Chicago is located, by 30,000 and the state by 140,000. The same figures are given for Deane, republican, for governor. **Later Results.** President Roosevelt's estimated 325 electoral votes, as the result of yesterday's balloting, may be increased by the eighteen votes from Missouri, when the returns from this state shall have been counted. On the other hand, they may be decreased by seven votes when Missouri is completed in West Virginia, which is believed to favor the republican party. In Missouri, where the republican was re-elected, Governor Bray has elected Walbridge for governor by 3,000 to 4,000 and has carried the state for Roosevelt. In West Virginia, the returns have come in very slowly but a republican victory is indicated. A surprise in the election is the fact that several northern states, notably Massachusetts and Maine, elected democratic governors in the face of astonishing pluralities for Roosevelt.

FIRST ARMY Will Now Be Commanded By Linevitch

A CANNONADE BY RUSSIANS THAT HAD NO PARALLEL IN WEEKS. Japanese Loan Of £12,000,000 Arranged—Report That Assault On Port Arthur Has Ceased—Chinese Official Executed By Japanese For Spying. Special to the Whig. London, Nov. 9.—(Litt.-Gen. Linevitch, recently appointed to the command of the first army, arrived yesterday by special train, and was met by Gen. Sakharoff. He was enthusiastically welcomed by all the troops. Gen. Linevitch will take command immediately. The Russian front now extends sixty-six miles. Quiet was broken on the morning of November 24th by a Russian cannonade of an intensity that has had no parallel in weeks. There is no sign yet of a Japanese advance.

Japanese Assume Offensive. St. Petersburg, Nov. 9.—Gen. Sakharoff reports that the Japanese vanguard assumed the offensive on November 7th, along the line from Chang-tai to Anshan, and occupied the villages of Ouhai, Kitaitu, and Paou-tai. A Russian cannonade followed immediately. It was reported that the Japanese had 1,200 guns.

Russians Re-Invigorated. London, Nov. 9.—A Shanghai despatch to the Morning Post, says that the Russians on the Shiao Shiao line have re-Invigorated and now number 300,000 with 1,200 guns.

Chinese Official Executed. Shanghai, Nov. 8.—It is reported here that a Chinese official of high rank was executed by the Japanese on November 2nd, at the village of Shih-he, it is said on the order of Teng Chi, the military governor of the province of Sheng King. The official was discovered in the act of spying on the movements of the Japanese troops.

A Terrific Onslaught. London, Nov. 9.—A despatch to the Central News, from Cheloo states that the Japanese made a terrific assault on the defenses of Port Arthur, on Monday, and were repulsed. The Cheloo correspondent of the Daily Mail says that the assault on Port Arthur has been discontinued. The Japanese have been only partially able to hold captured guns and forts, owing to the Russian gun fire. The line of the blockade has been drawn nearer to the land.

The Chronicle says that a new Japanese loan of £12,000,000 has been arranged, and will be offered for subscription at the end of this week, or the beginning of next, half in London and half in New York.

Silenced Guns. Tokio, Nov. 9.—(4 p.m.)—It is reported that the Japanese have completely silenced the shells of the Ichijima and Susung mountains and that their main strength is now attacking Etso mountain.

Choosing A Rochester Bishop. Special to the Whig. New York, Nov. 9.—In response to the call of Archbishop Farley, the bishops of the New York province assembled today to pass upon the names selected for coadjutor bishop of Rochester, N.Y., to assist the present incumbent, Bishop McDonald, who is eighty-one years old. The persons most prominent mentioned for the honor are Very Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, vicar-general of the Diocese of Syracuse, and Rev. E. J. Hanna, a professor at St. Bernard's seminary. The names of these two and of a third candidate yet to be decided upon will be forwarded to Rome for the final selection.

He Pleads Guilty. Special to the Whig. Montreal, Nov. 9.—Sheldon T. Bent, secretary-treasurer of the Shawinigan Carriage Company, arrested some months ago on a charge of robbing the company of several thousands of dollars, and who put in formal plea not guilty, today changed his plea to guilty and will be sentenced Friday.

Not Likely To Recover. Special to the Whig. Toronto, Nov. 9.—Joseph Bartley, a laborer employed digging a trench at the new car shed of the Great West railway company, yesterday, when a heavy pile of bricks fell upon him. He is now in hospital with a fractured skull, and the doctors hold out little hope of his recovery.

He Was Remanded. Special to the Whig. London, Ont., Nov. 9.—Martin Quinn, arrested yesterday for alleged impersonation in the elections last Thursday, was before P. M. Love this morning for preliminary hearing. The name was remanded until Monday awaiting a closer investigation into the charges.

STORY OF BRUTALITY. Evidences In The Toronto Child Murder Case.

Special to the Whig. Toronto, Nov. 9.—At the trial, this morning, Alexander John Martin and his wife Ethel, were placed on trial for the murder of their eight-month-old child in August last. The infant, it will be remembered, was found floating in the bay at the time of the arrest. The woman admitted that she and her husband had taken their infant out in a boat, and that Martin, after hitting the child over the head with an oar, had thrown it into the water. This confession will not be used against the accused at this trial. During the progress of the hearing, this morning, the male prisoner was seen to pass something to his wife, which the latter hid in her sleeve. Thinking that it might be poison, the police warden was summoned, and a woman was searched. Tucked in her clothing was discovered a clipping from a local paper, containing a report of the evidence given in the police court at the time accused were committed.

BLOOD SEED AT POLLS. Two Election Judges Are Killed In Cripple Creek. Cripple Creek, Col., Nov. 9.—Two democratic election judges, were killed in this district yesterday, a Peabody deputy sheriff was mortally wounded and a number of democratic judges were beaten and thrown into jail. The judges, Ed. O'Leary, a democratic judge, and Ed. O'Leary, a democratic judge, were shot down by one of Sheriff Bell's deputies. They had ordered the deputy out of the polling place. He refused to go and, turning upon the judges, shot and killed them.

At Midway, Ed. Doyle, a deputy sheriff, assaulted Mrs. Kennedy, a democratic judge, and in a struggle she was beaten and thrown into jail. Ed. O'Leary, a democratic judge, was killed and shot Doyle, fatally wounding him. O'Leary was arrested. James Ward, the deputy who killed the two election officers in Goldfield, was a secret service man during the military rule in the district. Miller and Delbott were union men.

FASHIONABLE WEDDING. Miss Blanchet and Norman Ogilvie Married. Quebec, Nov. 9.—A very fashionable wedding occurred this morning, at the English cathedral, when Norman C. Ogilvie, Montreal, was joined to the bride of well-known Miss Blanchet, the accomplished daughter of Judge Blanchet. A large number of guests were present, including a number of Montrealers. The bride was accompanied by her father, and attended by the following bridesmaids: Miss Dorothy White, Miss M. L. Ogilvie, and Miss Naomi Wilson, and the groom was assisted as best man by his brother, D. W. Ogilvie. The ushers were Hope Scott, Jack Ogilvie, S. Stevenson, and Seymour Blanchet. A number of Quebec friends of the groom entertained him at dinner at the Garrison Club, last evening, when a most enjoyable time was spent.

PRINCE OF SIAM IN LOVE. Siam's Alliance With Family In Russia. Biarritz, Nov. 9.—The young Crown Prince of Siam, who has been spending the season at the Hotel Victoria, has fallen desperately in love with a Russian princess, the daughter of the Duke of Constantinople and sister of Princess Youriievski.

It is believed the Prince of Siam's suit will be favorably regarded by Russia, as the czar will be only too ready to oppose the friendship of Siam to the intrigues of the Japanese.

The court of Bangkok, however, it is believed, may hesitate to sanction the marriage, fearing complications with Japan.

CZAR'S MOVEMENTS. Has Gone To Bid Farewell To Troops. St. Petersburg, Nov. 9.—The emperor has left St. Petersburg for Vilna and Poland to bid farewell to the troops. He will be gone a week. A local paper prints a letter reviewing the voyage of the second Pacific squadron, in which the statement is made that three torpedo boats, seemingly on hostile intent, were seen off the Spanish coast during the night of October 26th.
