DISORDER IN CHINA.

Rioters Active In Province Of Hoan. Shanghai, Nov. 9.—Several thousand rioters entered Kailing, the capital of the province of Hoan (235 miles north of Hankow), and destroyed ten miles of telegraph wires. The rioters were well armed and serious trouble is feared.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—R. P. Gilmore, well-known as a brewer's agent, appeared in the police court, this morning, charged with embezzling \$1,000 from the Hygiene Ice company, of which he is treasurer. He had \$500 deposited for stock and it is said he only deposited \$400. He denies the charge. He was remanded.

All Escaped.

New York, Nov. 9.—Public School No. 11, on West 5th street, is on fire. The children all escaped from the building safely but a terrible panic was only narrowly averted.

James Cumberland (Stella).

Deficit On Intercolonial.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—Returns for the year 1903-04 just completed at the railway department show the working expenses of the Intercolonial were \$7,269,868. In 1902-3 they amounted to \$6,196,653. Receipts last year were \$6,339,200, while the year before they were \$6,324,323. The operation of the year produced a deficit of \$909,668.

COFFEE FIVE DOLLARS A CUP.

Discover Clever Device For Gambling. The Brooklyn police discovered recently a restaurant about a stone's throw from the Borough hall, where coffee is sold at from 1 to 3 a cup. What they found was in the place buying coffee at such astonishing prices. Most of the coffee drinkers were law clerks, and men from offices, most of them of a class with a modest income.

MANY SEIZURES. Of Fish, Game, Venison, And Muskrat Skins. Toronto, Nov. 9.—Deputy Game Warden Lovelady, at Ottawa, reports the seizure, so far, this season, of 2,000 partridges, and a quantity of fish, venison, and muskrat skins, that are being illegally shipped. In one case, half was seized, were found a number of rocks and partridges, the birds were taken out and the rocks were forwarded to their destination.

AFTER TWENTY YEARS.

Woman Released From Prison and Banished. St. Petersburg, Nov. 9.—Mary Figor, who had been confined in the Schlusselburg fortress for twenty years, has been released and banished to Archangel, Northern Russia. The woman was condemned to life imprisonment for participating in nihilist conspiracies. She waved her handkerchief as a signal, indicating the approach of Alexander II, when he was assassinated here in 1881. She still avows desperate nihilist sentiments.

INNISBRUCK RIOTS.

Confesses To Having Killed German Artist. Vienna, Nov. 9.—A corporal in an Italian regiment of conscripts, on duty at Innsbruck, has confessed that it was he who had shot and killed the German artist Prezyer. The corporal says that, fearing discovery, he hid the bayonet. This development is expected to greatly increase the difficulty of the industry, in effecting a peaceable settlement of the affair.

NO NEW DEVELOPMENTS.

In The Provincial Political Affairs. Toronto, Nov. 9.—There were no political developments this morning. Premier Ross was called upon by several members of the legislature, and there are a number of quiet conferences going on. It is believed that at yesterday's meeting of the cabinet some important appointments were put through, but nothing has been handed out yet concerning them.

Quebec, Nov. 9.—To-day being the anniversary of the birthday of King Edward, the different military stations throughout the empire marked the day and the usual salute was fired from the citadel at noon. An official dinner is given, this evening, in honor of the event by Lieut. Gov. Jette at Spencerwood.
