CHANGES MADE IN SOME OF INTER-COLLEGIATE RULES.

Varsity's Amendments Received Too Late To Be Considered—Touch-Line Rule May Be Changed—The Officers Elected.

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President Baldwin, in his address, stated that the season had been the longest one in the history of the college union. Play of the senior teams was most interesting, especially that of Queen's and McGill. The tenyard game was responsible for this, the game being made much more open, He congratulated McGill and Queen's on their splendid team play. The president advised that in future referees study the rule book more carefully. He last grounded, it should be allowed to retain possession of the ball, in view of its first gain. Mr. Martin, of McGill, opposed the change. The proposal of Queen's, however, was favorably received by the Varsity representatives, and after a thorough discussion was adopted.

President Baldwin thought that the touch-line rule should be revised, making every three-drops count as a scrimmage in order to prevent a team when near an opponent's goal line from running into touch on the third scrimmage. This proposal will be considered at the meeting next spring.

Several additions were made to the rules concerning referees and umpires, in view of the system of downs. Queen's proposed that the umpire should declare whether a "clean" has been made or not, the necessary distance in three successive downs. This did not meet with favor, it being held that the umpire had enough to do.

The eligibility rule was changed, and hereafter certificates of players must be signed both by the college registrar, and also by an academic head of a faculty.

The amendments proposed by Varsity had not been sent to the secretary in time to give the other clubs notice of them they could not be considered, and hence the proposal to adopt the snap-back system must wait until the union's meeting next February.

Those officers were elected for the coming year: Honorary president—Prof. McLeod, McGill.
